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State to Deposit Paper Drive \$1,514,650.72 For Payments Slated Oct. 27

Salem's next waste paper collection by boy scouts will be made Sunday, October 27, it was announced yesterday by Gardner Knapp of the civilian service collection committee. He said Salem merchants will provide necessary trucks to be used in the pick-up. Proceeds from the collected waste paper will go toward the purchase of additional boats and other aquatic equipment for the boy scouts' Camp Pioneer, Knapp stated. Proceeds from waste paper drives in the four war years netted \$4000 for the boy scout camp building fund and for a motion picture projector, he added.

The state treasurer, during October, also will pay at his office here \$30,000 in principal and \$9912.50 in interest on bonds issued by the state board of higher education.

These principal payments will reduce the outstanding highway bonds to \$4,000,000, veterans' bonds to \$9,775,000 and state board of higher education bonds to \$1,227,000.
