

Vets Urged to Pick Insurance Beneficiaries

To save their families possible litigation later, veterans owning G.I. insurance should name beneficiaries in their policies, James S. Harris, Veterans Administration representative in this area, advised today.

"Families of some veterans have discovered recently that in policies where no beneficiary is named, insurance is paid over to the estate, with all the litigation which that usually involves," Harris said.

The VA representative reminded these ex-servicemen who have allowed their national service life insurance to lapse that their policies may be reinstated simply by paying two monthly premiums and furnishing their own statement of unchanged health.

The VA's branch insurance office in Seattle has advised Harris that among the half-million G.I. insurance accounts in the Northwest, about 200 premium payment daily are received without identification.

The VA office at 167 So. High st. will advise any veteran with his G.I. insurance problems, Harris said. Hours here are from 8 a.m. to 5 p.m. daily, telephone 8998.

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Attorney Talks at Realty Luncheon

Wage Ruling to Affect 80% of Vet Trainees

About 80 per cent of Oregon's veterans taking on-the-job training under the G.I. bill will suffer at least some reduction in subsistence payments because of new limitations on combined earnings, Wayne F. Smith, Veterans Administration Training Officer here, pointed out today.

The VA's regional office in Portland has informed Mr. Smith that a sampling of files for the state indicates that 1200 or more veterans are subject to removal from the subsistence rolls immediately.

Those already are earning \$175 a month if single or \$200 if with dependents, even without counting in their government checks, hence are no longer eligible for subsistence under new amendments to the G.I. bill, Mr. Smith explained.

About 600 other veterans are expected to exceed the earnings ceilings within 90 days as they progress to a higher wage scale and an additional 1000 within six months. Altogether, about 7000 ex-servicemen and women were counted recently in on-the-job training. Four out of every five will take at least some reduction because the VA can pay in subsistence only the difference between actual earnings on the job and the \$175 and \$200 ceilings.

The VA expects to survey on-the-job-training establishments to determine if courses meet standards set by the new law. Veterans will not be removed from training while their courses are being examined, however.

State Council of CIO Favors Third Party

PORTLAND, Ore., Sept. 28.—(P) A third national political party was asked in a resolution passed by the Oregon state industrial union council, CIO, at its convention today.

The resolution claimed labor and the people "are being betrayed and sold out" by republicans and that "even the democratic party is primarily a party of the rich and wealthy."

Endorses Snell

The council endorsed republican Governor Snell for reelection, but switched to the democratic candidacy of David C. Epps of Mill City for secretary of state and Ralph Peoples, Silverton, for state labor commissioner and voted to support all four democratic candidates for congress.

To Support PAC

Support of the CIO political action committee was urged for this year's elections because of the impossibility of launching a third party before that time.

Secretary Stanley Earl labeled the GOP "the party of big business" and said that Truman should again return to the haberdashery he used to run.

Lt. Clinton to Head Unit

Lt. James M. Clinton, USNR, Salem, was appointed by Capt. James E. Parrott as commanding officer of the electronics unit of the peacetime naval preparedness program, which is to be put into effect here. Lt. Walter Riddell, Molalla, was named executive officer at Friday night's meeting.

Capt. Parrott, assistant to the district director of naval reserve for electronic warfare units, said that first major task of the unit is to locate housing. Present appropriations provide excellent equipment, but no money for rentals, he said.

There will be no definite enlistment period for the company of 40 rated men and five officers, which will drill here on a strictly volunteer basis. Membership in the naval reserve, subject to call to active duty in wartime, will be the only obligation.
