

First Term of Night School to Start Monday

Ten courses of study are prepared for adult education in the first term of Salem's public night school which opens Monday. Besides these courses, numerous others and shop work are being arranged for the state and veterans' apprenticeship program.

All courses meet one night each week, all but two of the courses offer college credit, and all are open to both veterans and non-veterans, both those wishing college credit and those not. Fees range from \$7 to \$12 for the term.

Veterans may obtain tuition and textbook allowances for the courses under either the GI bill or state law. Details of registration will be explained at the first meeting of each class next week.

Lead, Zinc Mines In Nevada, Idaho

WASHINGTON, Oct. 3—(AP)—The U. S. bureau of mines said today that its secret research led to the war-time commercial development, hitherto undisclosed, of lead and zinc mines in Nevada and Idaho.

S. H. Lorain of Albany, Ore., said in a report that the bureau's work in the pearl fault of the Clark Ford lead-zinc district in Bonner county, Idaho—a fault which had been in production on a small scale since 1913—indicated the presence of ore bodies "of exceptional strength and persistence." Commercial development confirmed the fault's continuity and mineralization.
