

Gardening Today

From the October calendar of the Salem Men's Garden club: If you sowed seed of perennials in late spring or early summer, now is the time to transfer the seedlings to their permanent locations. The application to almost all perennials and biennials, like pansies, columbine, delphinium, primrose, rock garden perennials and so on. L.H. Madsen en. Planted now they will grow sufficiently this fall to establish themselves before winter halts growth. Of course, they may be carried over in plastic-covered plant flats or other containers, and planted as early in the spring as they can be transferred to permanent locations. In this case they will not bloom so early as the fall-planted seedlings and may not bloom until the following year.

As one gains in experience in handling perennials, the firmer becomes his conviction that the fall is by far the better season for outdoor planting of both perennials and biennials. This is true both for producing earlier bloom and for ensuring sturdier plants. The latter is the more important advantage over spring planting.

Geranium Cuttings
Sometime this month, or at least early November, geranium cuttings should be taken and set in moist sand. If plants are still in bloom, select cuttings to suit your preference. The branch tips make

good cuttings. However, if your source of supply is limited, portions of the lateral branches below the tips may be used. These stockier cuttings will send out side growth that in time will develop into upright stock. When ready for outdoor planting they will be difficult to distinguish from plants grown from tip cuttings.

Cuttings should be kept moist in the sand but never wet. They are likely to rot when too wet. When the white rootlets are formed the plants should be potted. Cuttings set out now should be ready for potting at least by the first of the year. A well-developed root system on the cutting in the sand container is the sign that potting time has arrived. Lift up the cuttings occasionally to determine the extent of the root growth. Rarely will you lose a cutting with a well-formed root development but you are very likely to lose those with limited root growth.

Questions and Answers:
Mrs. C. A. E. sends a specimen of rhododendron leaves, showing brown and asks why they should be so disfigured.

ANS.: Sunscorch seems to be the trouble. Several of the rhododendrons show signs of too much sun during the few very hot days this summer. While the shrubs mulched well? Long waterings at a time are more beneficial than short sprinklings several times. Too, the watering should not be done while the sun is shining on the foliage.

There is root weevil, which injures strawberry and primrose plants, that will work on the rhododendrons and azaleas, but these particular leaves do not indicate this is the trouble. In case of root weevil, it is wise to bait for this several times in spring. As a rule, notices are given in this column and in other sections of The Statesman when it is time to bait.

Mrs. D. E. P. asks how to pot and care for the avocado which she started outdoors from a seed.

ANS.: It should be moved before the first frost. Avocado do not like any frost. Take sufficient soil up with it so as not to disturb the roots more than necessary. Keep it well watered until established. As a warning: you might as well start with a comparatively large container. Avocado outgrow most things in a hurry and unless you have greenhouse facilities, it will soon outgrow the house itself.

control for this insect borne virus disease. The leaf hopper is the carrier and following a dusting of the plants with DDT the hopper is killed, not by eating the poison but by stepping in it. Aster wilt is being controlled by growers who have bred a wilt-resistant plant.

S.H.S. Band at Record High Membership

Salem high school's band, with 115 players, has the largest membership in the history of the school, it was announced Saturday by Vernon Wiscarson, instrumental music supervisor for the Salem public schools.

Wiscarson also disclosed that the high school this year will have for the first time a string orchestra, to be directed by Victor Palmason, a new instructor who came from Seattle to supervise stringed instrument instruction in the public schools.

Musical instruction in the elementary grades, moreover, is being emphasized. Throughout the 14 public schools, more than 400 students already are enrolled in band and orchestra work, Wiscarson said.

Elementary classes in the elementary schools give any pupil the opportunity to learn to play a musical instrument under certified teachers, and to play in school music groups. Instruction is provided free, beginning with the third grade.

Wiscarson is Raymound Clark, turned from service to resume duties as Leslie band and orchestra leader; Karl Thelen, moved from Leslie to Parrish to conduct the string orchestra and band besides directing the high school orchestra, will instruct beginning string classes in both junior high school and assist Wiscarson in grade school band and orchestra work.

Classes for 16-17-year-olds Starts Monday

Night classes for 16- and 17-year-old youths required to attend night school while working by day will begin Monday evening in conjunction with other adult education and apprenticeship-related night schooling.

In the required age group, 43 already have registered and have been tested for appropriate class-work, according to George D. Porter, night school director, who expects an additional 30 to enroll Monday.

Among new night classes this year will be arts metal work in Shop 3 at Parrish junior high school, commercial law and Gregg shorthand at the senior high, all meeting every Monday and Wednesday at 7:15 p.m. Other courses include bookkeeping, clothing, business English, drafting, foods, mathematics, typing, welding—all meeting Mondays and Wednesdays and machine shop on Tuesdays and Thursdays. Still other classes are designed especially for apprentices, Porter said.

Tuition and book purchases for adults taking the 10-week courses range from \$12.50 to \$25 per course.

Porter stressed the necessity for all 16- and 17-year-olds now working during the day to register Monday night at the high school, to take the night class-work required by law.

Gentlemen:

By your most recent letter you admit that this customer-owned Bonneville Agency about September 10th requested that you make clearance for a crossing of your power lines on the Wallace Road, a public highway—which request is usual, and, of course Salem Electric would bear the expense.

True to Government reports, and particularly the most recent one: "Investigation of Expenditures for Lobbying" (which exposes methods of private monopoly as "a menace to private enterprise," which monopoly now would take the whole Bonneville and Grand Coulee Systems away from us), you have delayed 20 days your "discussions of measures to give clearances with codes."

Your attempts to have us restricted to 20 poles in Salem, your posting of "guardian angels" at each council meeting since then, your long letters to the City Council with the same "Know-How" that you publicize; (criticizing a pole or two, while you have 9,000 poles on our City Streets); your previous attempts to keep us off highways intended for the use of the public and all their utilities;—one simple reminder: it is you who are the hazard to safety, to the public interest, and to the public power that Congress has provided for us of this great Northwest.

As 20 days is sufficient notice, we are commencing service of our low-cost power over those lines for which you refused proper clearance. It is you who are maintaining a barrier; it is you who are injecting delay. It is now your responsibility.

I am publishing this letter to the end that the contents hereof may also be understood by the public, which now uses Government power through this agency, as well as others who are being restricted by your obstructionist tactics, policies and politics.

A copy of this letter is being sent to the Oregon Public Utilities Commission as well as to the press.
