Every Little Crumb

Leftover Bread Bolsters Up Budget, Goes Into Pancakes and Desserts

Saving every little crumb of bread has a double meaning these days, when foods scarce and it's high. Breadcrumbs can not only bolster up the menu, they can pad out the food budget a great deal—There's good flavor to be found in them that crumbs.

Bread crumb pancakes are an old time dish:
BREADCRUMB PANCAKES
2 tablespoons fat
1/2 cup dry breadcrumbs
1 cup boiling water
1 egg, beaten
1 cup milk
1 cup sifted flour
4 teaspoons baking powder
1/2 teaspoon salt
Measure fat into mixing bowl, add water and stir until fat melts. Let stand five minutes then add

BREAD CRUMB COOKIES
1 cup evaporated milk
1 tablespoon vinegar
1 cup fine dry bread crumbs
1/2 cup butter or other fat
1 cup sugar
1/2 cup beaten
1 teaspoon vanilla
2 cups sifted flour
1/4 teaspoon salt
1/4 teaspoon cinnamon
1/4 teaspoon cloves
1/4 teaspoon soda
Combine milk with vinegar and add to crumbs. Cream butter, add sugar and beat until fluffy. Add egg and vanilla. Sift flour, salt, spices, and soda together and add to egg mixture. Stir in the softened crumbs and the raisins. Drop batter from a teaspoon onto a greased cookie sheet. Bake in a moderate oven (375° F.) 15 minutes. Yield: 36 cookies.
