Instead we heard expounded entirely impossible economics with the statement that it was possible to raise wages 30 per cent without raising prices." Stassen, who was Admiral Halsey's flag lieutenant during the war, said he believed "the republican party should make it clear that it would give vigorous continuous support to the growth and development of the United Nations Organization."
