CHICAGO, Oct. 15-(AP)-Grain futures jumped sharply with most other commodities in early trade today but really hit the skids near the finish.

Corn led the downturn, dropping as much as 814 cents a bushel from the early highs which had pushed prices up about 31/4 from yesterday's finish. Oats and wheat followed corn downward falling as much as 1% and 1%. respectively, from the previous
