

Public Affairs Speaker at Banquet

Climaxing activities of the annual business and professional women's convention of the local club entertained at a large formal banquet at the Marion hotel Thursday night. Guests included representatives from women's clubs, civic groups of the city, and out-of-town clubs.

E. B. MacNaughton, president of the First National Bank of Portland, was the guest speaker. Using the week's theme, "Let's work together for better communities," he touched on possibilities in improvement of Salem's traffic problems, the need for an historical society here, and discussed future growth of Salem. State and federal problems also came in for discussion.

His opinion was that parking meters and careful placement of a new bridge may help solve the traffic problem. He also discussed the need for decentralization in the business areas.

He listed the need for more financial support for schools, for careful study of the Townsend bill, and for revision of state tax law.

"Labor must have an intelligent policy before real prosperity can be felt. The time will come when both sides will consider the public and when both capital and labor will work together."

Concluding, he expressed his belief that eventually there will be a better world and harmony will again prevail.
