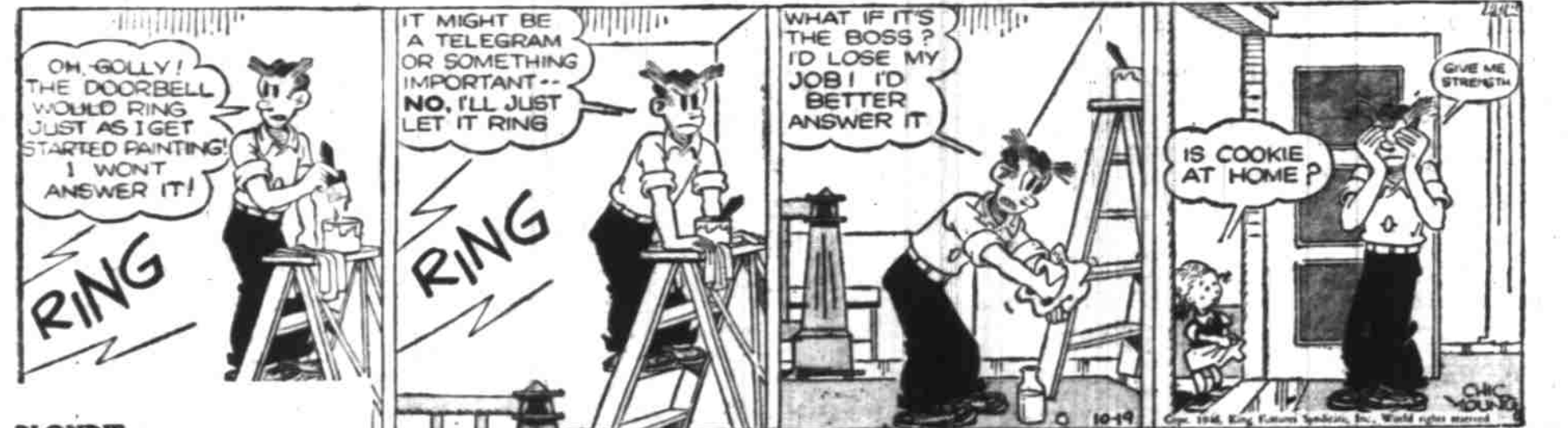


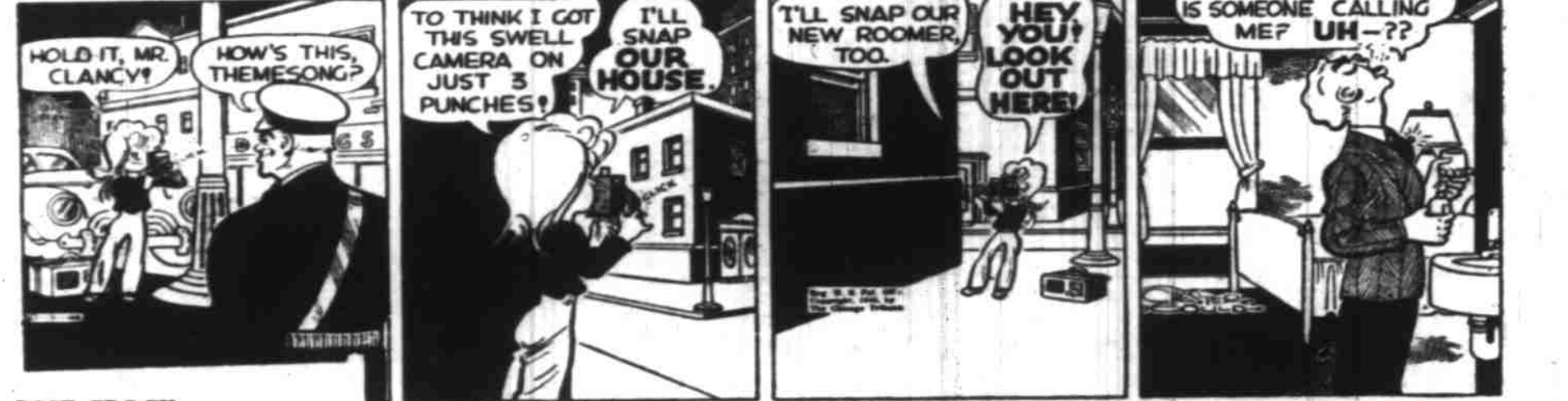

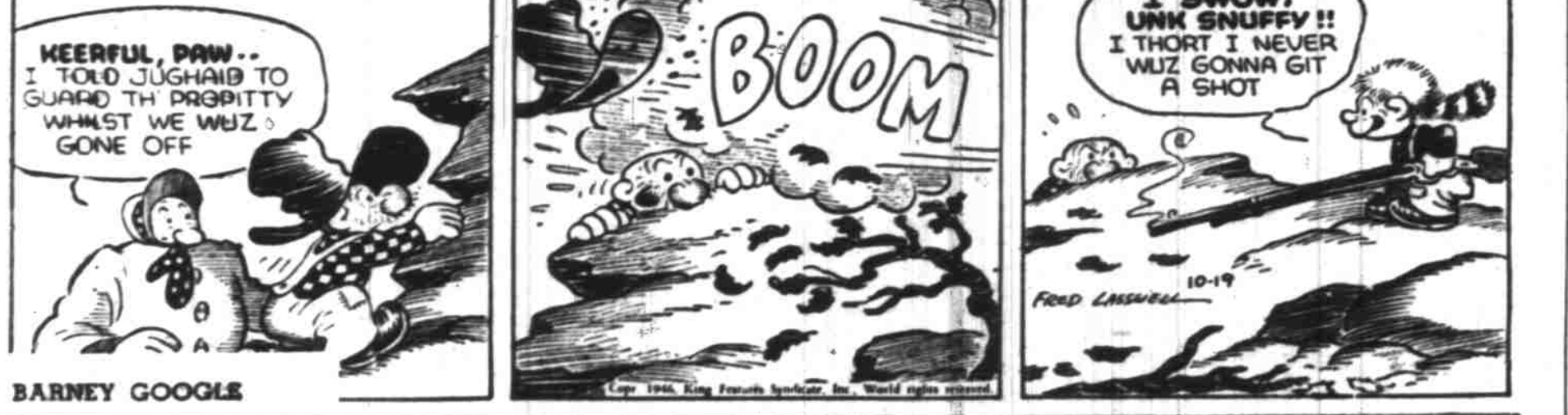

Dallas Honors Polk 4-H Club Boys and Girls

DALLAS, Oct. 18—Outstanding 4-H club members of Polk county were guests of Dallas Chamber of Commerce at luncheon today when special county prizes and trophies were presented and later all club members were guests of the chamber at a motion picture show.

Polk county, which many times has had what other communities might feel was more than its share of the top dairy records, not only of the state, but even of the nation, goes noticeably light on 4-H dairy clubs. This fact was commented upon by Russell Daulton, assistant county agent in charge of club work, at the luncheon.

"Boys and girls get all the dairy work and theory they want at home," was Daulton's explanation, as he reviewed the 4-H club work of the county. Club members have increased from 245 in 1945 to 275 in 1946, and leaders from 57 to 66 in 1946, but less work was completed this year. Daulton said, "It gave the high wages available for the club members in the harvest fields as a possible reason."

Buying Noted in Corn Futures

CHICAGO, Oct. 18 (AP)—A belief that demand for corn will expand as a result of lifting of government restrictions on uses of that grain today, prompted buying in corn futures today. Oats tended to follow the leadership of corn, advancing for small gains in an active trade, but wheat was unable to exhibit any rallying power following the 5-cent break yesterday. Uncertainty regarding what action will be taken on flour ceilings was depressing wheat.

Stock Leaders Slip Slightly

NEW YORK, Oct. 18 (AP)—Scattered stocks made a little progress on the recovery side today while many market leaders were neglected in slightly lower territory. Transfers of 920,000 shares compared with 1,310,000 Thursday. Wall Street quarters thought that erratic shifts of commodities and livestock prices remained as a speculative and investment restraint for securities.
