

Four Artists On Concert Series

Four artist concerts are available to Salem people through the Crescendo Concert series. Jean Watson, Canadian contralto, will open the season Monday, Nov. 4 at 8:15 p.m. Miss Watson was soloist at the Bach Festival in Bethlehem, Penn. and the past summer was at Tanglewood, Mass. Festival. She was selected by Koussevitzky of the Boston orchestra for exacting parts in many of the master works under his direction during the 1946 season. Angel Reyes, Cuban violinist, from the Juilliard school in New York, comes with the approval of severest critics. Her concert will be Friday, Dec. 6. James Pease, baritone, will complete the series Wednesday, Feb. 26. He served as a lieutenant in the army and returned to civilian life last January. He is reputed to be the successor to Nelson Eddy in style and popularity. His itinerary this year includes an extensive tour from coast to coast. In addition he is booked foratorio and operatic appointments.

The four artists are from Columbia concerts, New York, and all are new to the Pacific Northwest. Season subscriptions are now available at local music stores and from Crescendo club members.
