MONMOUTH — Earl J. Partlow, city mail carrier here, says he began patrolling Monmouth streets delivering mail 20 years ago, October 16. Since that time he has computed his walking as 80,000 miles in the line of duty. He has handled three and one-third million pieces of mail weighing approximately 200 tons. He began on a 48 hour week, which in 1931 was reduced to 44 hours, and later to 40 hours, although during the war he has worked 46 hours. He formerly carried all the mail himself but now has a part-time helper.
