Mrs. James T. Brand and Carlton B. Greider are co-chairmen of the drive to reach the goal of \$180,000 to meet construction costs. The Rev. Charles Durden, pastor of the Calvary Baptist church, was appointed to assist Greider. About \$100,000 had been

subscribed when the drive was temporarily suspended during the summer.

The campaign group is to work as individuals rather than in groups.

WASHINGTON, Nov. 6 — (AP) President Truman decisively settled an intra-governmental squabble today by announcing that the United States will place former Japanese islands under United Nations trusteeships which this country will administer.

The decision meant that the state department in effect had won a long-standing debate with the war and navy departments on the delicate issue.
