The following classifications are listed:
 Division I—Disbudded. Sec. 1—one bloom to vase, exhibition and/or commercial. Sec. 2—arrangement of horticultural specimens; classes: chrysanthemum, pomponas, spiders, anemones, singles and buttons.
 Division II—Artistic arrangements (other foliage or flowers allowed) Sec. 1—all white. Sec. 2—dining room arrangements. Sec. 3—kitchen window arrangements, including class for coffee table and hall. Sec. 4—arrangement showing restraint, no more than five flowers. Sec. 5—arrangement not to exceed 6 inches in height.
 Division III—Floral arrangements (flowers foliage or fruit) Sec. 1—high or low. Sec. 2—Thanksgiving table and accessories. Sec. 3—using dried material. Sec. 4—using dried material. Sec. 5—corsages. Sec. 6—identical containers, competition in club flowers. Sec. 7—arrangement not to exceed 6 inches in height.
 Division IV—Garden club exhibits (each club to enter one only).

 She was with the first group of foreigners forced out of Siam by the Burma route. She joined one of Dr. Seagrave's (Burma Surgeon) mobile surgical units for Chinese soldiers and fifteen days later was back in her own station of Kiuilungiang. She was bombed out of her home, and she then went to a leper village to live. Her young flier son, John, was wounded in combat in the late war, and her daughter, Wilma, was interned in Manila. She returned to the United States on furlough last April.
