

Typical Unemployed Veteran Emerges from Job Board Files

Oregon's typical unemployed veteran is well along in his thirties, semi-skilled, lives in town, may have a minor disability, worked both before and after the war, has been out of work eight or nine months, has contacted several employers and the local employment office but hasn't found suitable work where he can obtain housing.

This statement by the unemployment compensation commission was based on special interviews with approximately 700 long-time claimants. As administrator for the readjustment allowance section of the GI bill of rights in Oregon, the commission pointed out that only about 3 1/2 per cent of the 110,000 returned veterans now were drawing readjustment allowances and that very few cases of outright chiseling had been found by repeated investigations.

"We have found it necessary to turn over these cases to the veterans administration for possible prosecution," Silas Gaiser, commission administrator, declared. Gaiser said other alleged irregularities were being investigated and appropriate action would be taken.

Of the veterans whose characteristics were listed, 82 per cent were 30 years or older, 73.2 per cent live in cities, 45.2 per cent were skilled or semi-skilled and 36 per cent had worked since being discharged from military service.

About 12 per cent had been out of the service less than seven months and 30 per cent more than a year. In addition to the skilled and semi-skilled workers, nearly a fourth had experience in clerical, sales and service lines, while 6 per cent claimed professional and managerial qualifications.

Latest count showed 54,382 veterans claims, of which 3,195 were for self-employment allowances. Claimants who drew at least one check numbered 46,582 while 152 received their full allowances, now averaging over \$800 each.

Veterans discharged after ten months or more service are entitled to 52 weekly allowances of \$20 while seeking suitable work.

Belated Buying Aid to Stocks

NEW YORK, Nov. 14.—(AP)—Belated buying rescued the stock market from the doldrums today and enabled selected motors, steels, rails and associated industrials to finish with comfortable advances.

Irregularly lower trends ruled from the start to the final half hour with dealings slow. The pace quickened a bit as bids arrived but there was no runaway. Gains of fractions to a point or more were well in the majority at the close with a few "thin" issues enjoying wider jumps. Transfers totaled 950,000 shares compared with 1,650,000 Wednesday.

Demand was based partly on the idea the list was due for a technical comeback. Rallying cotton and grains buoyed sentiment. Pleasing company statements also were helpful. Many customers held aloof, however, pending the effects of rising goods prices, consumer resistance and the outcome of wage disputes.

Export Demand Spurs Grains

CHICAGO, Nov. 14.—(AP)—Export demand for grains and grain products today spurred a sharp upturn in cereal futures, wheat, corn and oats all closing on gains extending to more than 3 cents.

Heavy buying of flour overnight by South American countries, purchases of around a million bushels of corn for export by the government and small scale buying of oats in the northwest by the commodity credit corporation were the major factors behind the advance.

Wheat finished 1 1/2-3% higher. January \$2.06 1/2, corn was up 2 1/2-3%, January \$1.32 1/2, and oats gained 1 1/2-3%, November \$2.12. Lard futures jumped the daily limits of 200 points, July closing at 23.40 cents a pound, on short-covering stimulated by advancing hog quotations.

Flour prices were quoted at \$5.80 to \$6.00 a sack against \$5.60.
