

Deck the Halls, 'Tis Season of Oregon Holly

"Deck the halls with boughs of holly..." That's the sentiment that has boosted Oregon's English holly crop from an interesting seasonal crop into an industry which this year will export out of the state a half million dollars' worth of holly for decorative use during the coming Christmas season.

This was among points on holly culture explained yesterday noon before Salem Lions Club by Ambrose Brownell of Milwaukie, poultryman and commercial holly grower who has done much to boost the Oregon holly business.

Brownell predicted the holly industry would export \$5,000,000 worth of the product a year in the near future, provided the high quality of English holly now being exported is maintained. He said that holly grows only in western Oregon and Washington and has proven a good commercial crop because of the demand for it from the East where none grows.

Packing the holly so that only good cuttings are crated and the holly arrives east in good condition is a task that requires unskilled seasonal workers. "But they're easy to train," Brownell said. "I just tell them to pack a box as if they were sending it to their mother."

Brownell operates a 125-acre holly farm along the east-side highway between Oregon City and Portland. His father planted the first holly orchard 37 years ago there, "and folks thought he was crazy," Brownell said at the luncheon meeting in the Hotel Marion.
