



Cash Wheat, **Futures Hit** 26-Year High

CHICAGO, Nov. 20-(AP)-New 26-year peaks were established in both cash wheat and wheat futures on the Board of Trade today, although price advances in most grain contracts were of moderate proportions.

A car of No. 1 mixed wheat, which dealers said consisted of about 85 per cent soft red winter grade, brought \$2.25 in the spot markets. This was the best price for cash wheat since the post-war inflationary boom of 1920, when wheat rose well above \$3.00 a bushel.

The January wheat contract hit \$2.13\frac{1}{2}\$, highest for any bread cereal future since October, 1920.

Wheat finished 1/2-11/4 higher, January \$2.13, corn was 1/4 lower to 1/4 higher, January \$1.33%-1/4. and oats closed 1/4 lower to 11/4 higher, November 84-841/a.

In the New York market wheat flour prices were advanced 5 to 20 cents a sack while rye flour was hiked 10 to 40 cents. Trade reports said mills were having difficulty in obtaining railroad cars in which to ship flour.

Both cash and futures prices of corn were steady despite fairly heavy arrivals.
