Coffey, said last night that actually Salem Taxi Co. insurance had not been revoked although notice of a higher premium rate necessitated the writing of new policies this week.

The city council had acted upon information from the state public utilities commission that PUC licenses were revoked because the taxi firm's liability insurance had been discontinued. 
