For an easily prepared main dish and vegetable combined, stuff half acorn or Danish squashes with canned, highly flavored meats. Apples may be cut finely and added to the mixture, too. pears, just a bit on the

underdone side, make good pie and luscious, without the grainy when treated just as other fruits. consistency of cooking pears. Merely squeeze a little lemon juice over them and sugar to taste, make with top crust or lattice

Last of a turkey, veal roast or chicken might appear as a meat pie, bolstered up with onion, carrots and potatoes. With a bowl of combination salad and some hot biscuits it makes a pretty good

Grate a little cheese into the dough that covers the apple pie. it will provide interesting flavor. Don't forget prune whip as a dessert that requires little su-

gar to make sweet. A Statesman reader writes that "Prunes are very nice to cook without sugar. Take out seed and slice, cook slowly down until very thick and seal." That's for fresh prunes, and it also goes for dried prunes as a breakfast fruit. A compote of several dried fruits re-quire little sugar and if spiced mildly and served hot for breakfast they make an excellent break-

Apples and sweet potatoes make an excellent casserole dish, especially when a few nuts are added. French onion soup, recipe for which may be found in any good cookbook, is an excellent Sunday

night supper dish. Now that whipped cream's here again, it can make simple dishes rather dressy. Fold broken up peanut butter into the whipped cream to top baked apples or puddings.




