Stocks Stage Late Recovery
NEW YORK, Dec. 3.—(AP)—Selected stocks got a belated foothold on recovery in today's market after the list had been depressed most of the session by further pessimism over the coal crisis.
Losses ran to 2 or more points for pivots in the forenoon with selling light. Buyers began to step in after midday and extreme declines were trimmed or converted into advances in the final hour with the pace quickening a bit for an interval. There was another slowdown toward the last and top marks were reduced. Plus signs, however, held the majority at the close.
The Associated Press 60-stock composite was up 3 of a point at 62.7 of 95.3 issue, appraising, 433 rose and 341 fell. Transfer of 950,000 shares compared with 810,000 Monday.

Firm Trend in Grain Futures

CHICAGO, Dec. 3.—(AP)—Grain futures carried a firm undertone in today's trading, which was light at times. Fair buying developed following an announcement of the commodity credit corporation that it has purchased 920,000 bushels of wheat at Kansas City, which prompted short covering. The firm tone of the local cash corn and oats markets was a contributing influence.
At the close wheat was 1/4 lower to 1 1/4 higher than yesterday's finish, January \$2.05 1/4. Corn was 1/4 to 1/2 higher, January \$1.30 1/4-1/2. Oats were 1/4 lower to 1/2 higher, December 80 1/4. Barley was unchanged to 1/4 higher, December \$1.33 1/4. Lard was unchanged, July \$22.50.
