

through an electrical circuit which was completed by a row River Pollution Salem's civic committee on sewage disposal last night laid plans for the public showing of motion

pictures depicting Willamette river pollution, at a civic meeting tentatively scheduled for January 24. The committee, representing various organizations of the city. has been conducting meetings to better acquaint Salem with the need for improved sewage disposal methods, as proposed in a city sewage treatment plant.

At last night's committee meeting in the chamber of commerce hall, approximately 25 committeemen heard Fred Merryfield, Corvallis consulting engineer, discuss sewage problems. The speaker

emphasized the dangers of general stream pollution as well as health dangers in the immediate city areas along rivers. Merryfield also discussed the

possibility of incorporating into a sewage disposal system the means of disposing of cannery wastes. He said this would require further experiment before any concrete plans might be proposed,

but that he felt the problems of cannery and general sewage wastes might eventually be solved together. More than 90 percent of Mexico's population is of pure Indian
