Firemen Save 10 in Canadian Hotel Blaze

PENTICTON, B. C., Dec. 26.—(CP)—Trapped in the smoke-filled second story of the British Columbia hotel, 10 guests were rescued by firemen today when fire cut off escape via stairways. One man was injured. There were 50 people in the hotel when the fire started.

Many of the guests were asleep when the alarm was sounded, and a 20-year-old chambermaid, Pat Lehman, was credited with saving many. She ran through the halls rousing late holiday sleepers and guiding them to safety. The fire, of unknown origin, broke out in a washroom at 9:15 a. m. and spread rapidly through the second story, but most of the building was saved. No estimate of the property damage was immediately available.

MT. ANGEL, Dec. 26 — John Nieuweoeer, 89, resident of Molalla since 1911, died there at his home on Christmas day. Funeral services will be held in Mt.
