New City Manager Assures City Department Heads of Support

Department heads of Salem's new municipal government held the assurance of City Manager J. L. Franzen today that he was "with" them and "behind" them, and that "there will be no personnel change at the present time whatever."

Franzen met informally with the department heads Thursday afternoon a few hours after he had been voted into office. He told them he would be on call 24 hours a day, and he was "depending" on them to keep him informed as to details of their actions and planning, and pledged to the police department that officers, "so long as they are right," do not have to fear threats that someone "will get their jobs."

The city manager also asked his key personnel to "start thinking about improvements," and called for the "utmost efficiency" in administration.

To Get Credit for Items

The group also was told that "anyone with an idea will get credit for it if it comes before the council," and declared that "all have a great responsibility" in Franzen's announcement that he would have a meeting with department heads at least once a month brought a comment from veteran Police Chief Minto that the plan was "a fine thing." To Minto's query as to whether he should submit a report to the city manager whenever a non-civil service employee was released, Franzen said "that would be advisable."

Franzen also told City Engineer Harold Davis, in response to a question that any department head with the authority to hire automatically held the authority to discharge in the same category.

Hospitals Plan New Salary, Hours Scale

Following the example set by the states of California and Washington, Oregon hospitals, including the two Salem institutions, have agreed on a new wage and hours scale, personnel of the local hospitals said last night. The new scale, calling for a 44-hour work week, monthly salary of \$190 to \$225, two weeks vacation with pay, two weeks sick leave and a daily rest period, was suggested by the Oregon State Nurses' association meeting with

the State Hospital association late in 1946.

Salem General hospital nurses are on the new schedule which became effective at the beginning of the year. At the Salem Deaconess hospital a shortage of nurses has temporarily held up installation of the new schedule. Assistant Manager Irwin Wedel said last night that he would ask the Deaconess hospital board to establish the 44-hour week and pay schedule retroactive to January 1.

The state institutions, most of which are now on a 45-hour work week with a basic wage of \$180, will shortly come under the new civil service scale recently approved by Gov. Earl Snell. Under this set-up wage scales will range from \$180 per month to \$225, and will include a two weeks vacation period, one-month sick leave and benefits of the civil service

Whole-meal soups for January menus

After the rich foods of the holidays, simpler fare is welcome. Still menus need to be hearty to satisfy cold-weather appetites. These whole-meal soups make good eating these January days.

VEGETABLE SOUP WITH MEAT BALLS

This typical Mexican whole-meal soup is extremely versatile because canned vegetables may be substituted for the fresh and canned broth or consommé for the stock.

2 tbsps. shortening
1 medium-size onion, chopped
1/4 cup tomato sauce
6 cups chicken or beef stock
2 cups shelled peas (1 lb.)
2 cups sliced string beans (1/2 lb.)

2 tbsps. uncooked rice
1/4 lb. ground pork
1/4 lb. ground beef
6 mint leaves, chopped
2 tbsps. chopped parsley
1 slightly beaten egg
1 tsp. salt
1/2 tsp. pepper

Lightly brown onions in melted shortening in heavy kettle with tight-fitting lid. Add tomato sauce and chicken or beef stock, bring to boil. Add vegetables. Make meat balls: Combine rice, ground beef and pork, mint leaves, parsley, egg, salt and pepper. Drop in boiling soup. Cover lightly, simmer 30 minutes, or until meat balls are done and vegetables tender. Serves 6 to 8.

CHILI BEAN CHOWDER

This meatless chowder makes a satisfying whole-meal soup for a cold day.

2 cups dried red kidney beans
2 quarts cold water
1 medium-size onion, chopped
3 1/2 cups cooked or canned tomatoes

2 buds garlic
2 tps. chili powder
1 tsp. oregano or marjoram
2 tps. salt
1/2 tsp. pepper
1 1/2 cups evaporated milk

Wash beans and drain. Add water, cover and simmer until tender, about 2 hours. Add onion, tomatoes, garlic, and seasonings. Cook until onion is tender and seasonings well blended. Remove garlic. Add milk, heat, but do not boil. Serve in soup plates or bowls garnished with thin slice of lemon. Serves 6 to 8.
