Guarding Against Fire

It gives one pain to read of fires resulting in loss of life. Very often it is children who are caught in the flames or smoke, are unable to get out themselves and those outside are unable seems reconciled to this program.

We have had many such fires reported this year, though which had been threatened. With no mere than in former years. The home bursts into flame and those inside perish. Fire or life insurance is no salve for the grief that comes with loss of loved ones.

There is this difference between fires and auto accidents, both of which are bad killers. In the former case the controls for prevention lie almost wholly within the family; in the latter the men who are named to the case one may be the victim of a stranger's negligence.

Again we put emphasis on good housekeeping as a preventive of fire. At this season stoves and furnaces are kept going full tilt to provide heat. The dangers are therefore increased. An insurance circular lists the following percentages of causes of fires;

4. Carelesaness with kerosene lamps, candles, open lights of all kinds; kerosene stoves, and misuse of gasoline and other inflammable liquids for cleaning and other dangerous purposes 25.14 All other causes

(These other causes include fires originating off premises, 7.74%; lightning, 6.79%; ignition of hot grease, 301%; spontaneous combustion, 1.77%; gas, 1.42%; sporks from combustion, 98%; rubbish and litter. 87%; miscellaneous, 77%; explosions, 76%; friction, sparks from machinery, .73%; and fireworks, etc.,

Note the heavy proportion chargeable to human carelessness. Why not "double your guard" in your housekeeping? Check your flues, your electric wiring, your stoves. Set a mental monitor over your hands as you use cleaning fluids. lamps and inflammables.
