

Saalfeld Takes Position with Legion Post

H. C. "Hub" Saalfeld, retiring Marion county service officer, will be manager and executive secretary of Capital Post No. 9, American Legion, effective February 3, Rex Kimmel, post commander announced Monday night at the regular meeting of the post. Saalfeld has resigned his position as Marion county service officer effective the end of January. He was a first lieutenant in the army air forces and served as an instructor in advanced navigation and bombardment. The county service officer position was started by Saalfeld December 1, 1945, and was developed by him. Capital post went on record last night favoring all aid to Willamette university in securing approval by federal agencies for permission to build a new dormitory. The move was made since housing facilities for students, the majority of whom are veterans, is still critical, it was reported. New members taken into the post Monday night were James A. Chandler, L. CPA Approves Local Building, Synagogue

Construction applications for Salem totaling \$61,200 were approved by the civilian production administration in Portland Monday for L. A. Ballmer, Commercial Book Store, \$30,000 for a sales room Jewish congregation, \$26,200 for a synagogue, and Kingward Lumber company, \$5,000 for an addition. Members of the local Jewish congregation will meet Wednesday night at their lodge to prepare plans for the new synagogue. It was reported last night. The building will be constructed on Broadway avenue between Jefferson and Madison streets. The L. A. Ballmer book store will be located in the 300 block of N. Commercial street. Plans are being drawn for a one story concrete building, with full basement, of modern design. Construction will begin by early summer, according to Ballmer.

Oil Refinery Burns, Damage Set \$110,000

PORTLAND, Jan. 20—(AP)—An oil explosion at Refinery Industries Inc. today critically burned J. W. Adams, 57, an engineer, and started a fire that caused damage estimated by owners at \$110,000. The explosion, the cause on which was not determined, burned Adams' clothes off. Otto A. Olson and his son, Ray, who rent a part of the building, ran through the flames to rescue him. Seven others escaped unhurt. Flames raged for an hour before 18 pieces of fire equipment brought them under control. M. E. Vandewater, owner of the refinery which makes specialized industrial oils, estimated his loss at \$100,000 covered by insurance. The Olsons said their equipment loss was \$10,000.

Anderson Asks Smaller 1947 Potato Crop

WASHINGTON, Jan. 20—(AP)—Still troubled with surplus potatoes from last year's record crop, Secretary of Agriculture Anderson said tonight 1947 production goals will be cut much more sharply than previously announced. The original 1947 goals called for 100,000,000 fewer bushels of potatoes than last year. This was to avoid repetition of an \$80,000,000 loss the government sustained in buying surpluses to support farm prices. Fourteen states were allotted smaller acreages than they planted last year, but 34 states got more. Officials said, however, the increases were allowed states with low per-acre yields.

Mercury Rises As Roads Over State Improve

Higher temperatures in virtually all sections of the state, with improvement in the condition of many roads, particularly those in central and eastern Oregon, were reported here Monday by R. H. Baldock, state highway engineer. Moderate to strong winds and rain was reported in various parts of western Oregon. It was snowing lightly last night in the Santiam summit district. Baldock's report included: **Government Camp** — Raining. Packed snow and slush throughout entire section. Icy spots between mileposts 21 and 26, with sanding operations in progress. **Santiam Summit** — Snowing lightly with two inches of new snow over the week-end. Some light frozen slush and packed snow on roads. Roadside snow 51 inches. **Odell Lake** — Light fog. Rain during night. Packed snow and slush between mileposts 58 and 63. Snow removal equipment in operation. **Siskiyou** — Roads normal. **Oregon Coast highway** — One way traffic over temporary bridge 12 miles north of Florence. A short section of one way traffic one mile north of Manzanita and at two places between Gardiner and three miles north of that city. Rough road five miles south of Yachats.
