It's in the Cut

Less Expensive Cuts of Meat Make Fine Dishes When Cook Knows How

A housewife is judged by the looks of her house and also what kind of a meal she serves.

Meat, the most important single item on the budget—usually in this woman, if she's cook at all, can make a good dish out of a thick sirloin steak, juicy pork chops or a leg of lamb, but every family can't make room on the budget for expensive cuts every day. So it falls to the family cook to try her skill in preparing the less expensive cuts, those which have flavor but take more time to prepare. Once a woman has mastered the technique of cooking less tender cuts, like round and rump of beef, shoulder, chuck, flank or neck of lamb, shanks or breast of veal, she can cook in a culinary as well as economical way.

Take breast of veal for instance, it makes a wonderful roast when the bone is removed and a pocket made to hold stuffing. A fruity or simple sage stuffing is good. Skewer or sew the roll of meat and stuffing, put it in an uncovered pan, strip with bacon or other fat (because veal is quite lean) and roast at 350 or 375 degrees until done for 30 minutes to the pound.

Beef, the most popular of all meats, has many attractive, inexpensive cuts. Ground round steak can be made into patties and either oven or pan broiled. Moistened with 1/2 cup milk or cream, mix lightly with a fork, dip into fine breadcrumbs and pan fry, then add water to drippings, pour over steaks and you have one of the elegant sounding "Salisbury" steaks you've seen on menus.

Add crumbs to the ground meat, fry in a pan with onion rings and serve with bacon slices and you have another elegant dish.

Vienna steaks are about like our favorite hamburgers, except equal quantity of ground veal is added, an egg and onion are
