NEW YORK, Jan. 28-(AP)-David (Pete) Krakauer, said by the vet, go to the armory main event post again tonight to top Match- figure in the professional football title game bribery case.

A district attorney spokesman identified Krakauer, 44-year-old ex-convict; as the third man indicted yesterday by a grand jury on the word of Alvin J. Paris, who was convicted Jan. 8 of offering bribes in an attempt to fix the Dec. 15 contest. The police alarm, flashed at the request of District Attorney Frank S. Hogan, identified Kragauer as a "known gambler" who "may frequent race tracks and seashore resorts." Krakauer was questioned at a Bronx hospital last month in the football investigation but he disappeared from there. He was being treated for a cardiac ail-

The two others indicted, Harvey Stemmer and Jerome Zarowitz, pleaded innocent at their arraignment today. Zarowitz was held in \$10,000 bail. Stemmer already is serving a penitentiary term for attempted bribery of Brooklyn college basketball players in 1945. Zarowitz, 32, was said by police to have been a clerk in the Elizabeth, N. J., officer of a gambling ring for which Paris was front man. The trio was indicted on two bribery counts and one conspiracy count each in the football fix

Frank Filchock and Merle Hapes, New York Giants' backfield stars, testified at Paris' trial they were offered bribes of \$2,500 each and a \$1,000 bet on the Chicago Bears plus off-season jobs supposed to bring them \$15 000. The Bears won the national league championship game, 24 to 14. Meanwhile, denizens of "Jacobs

Beach," headquarters of the New York fistic fraternity at Madison Square Garden, were rocked by the revelation that a \$100,000 bribe had been offered hard punching Rock Graziano to throw a fight.

District Attorney Frank S. Hogan made clear that the investigation of attempted racketeering in sports was continuing on an allout basis and one report circulated that police had obtained permission to tap telephones of more than 60 bookies, fight managers and gamblers.
