

## Report Shows Inter-Relation Of City Offices

Close inter-relation of Salem's city government divisions are illustrated by the first combined monthly activities report of all city offices to City Manager J. L. Franzen.

The first report shows that City Attorney Chris J. Kowitz prepared 45 complaints against persons tried in Municipal Judge W. W. McKenney's court on charges preferred by arresting city police during January.

Three fires were lost in city accidents, Police Chief Frank A. Minto reports, explaining that two were results of auto-pedestrian accidents and that one person was killed when the car in which she was riding struck a tree.

**171 Accidents Investigated**  
A total of 171 auto accidents were investigated by city police in January. Seven persons incurred non-fatal injuries in auto crashes. Most were treated by first aid men, who took several to hospitals for further treatment.

Twenty-one stolen bicycles were recovered during the month and a record of only 26 were reported stolen.

**151 Cases Tried**  
Municipal Judge McKenney tried 151 cases resulting from arrests by city police. Six persons who pleaded innocent to charges of reckless driving, liquor involved, driving with restricted driver's license, reckless driving and drunken driving will not have trials until the city judge's courtroom is ready for occupation, the

**U. S. Indicts Five Nazi Industrialists**  
NUERNBERG, Feb. 8—(AP)—Five high ranking German industrialists were charged by the United States with complicity in the most odious deeds of the Hitler politicians and with profiting enormously from the victims of Nazi aggression.

Brig. Gen. Telford Taylor, chief American prosecutor, served a four-fold indictment against Friedrich Flick, 63, and four men associated with him in a steel and iron enterprise second only to that once controlled by Hermann Goering.

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**Woodburn Parking Problem Studied**  
WOODBURN—Parallel parking, the present situation in Woodburn with new marked off spaces for control, was authorized Tuesday night by the city council. As soon as weather permits, spaces and safety lanes will be marked off on Front and First sts., between Harrison and Arthur, and on side streets between First and Front. The length of

these spaces will be determined by the street committee after investigation. Subsequently, an ordinance requiring that motor vehicles be parked within the designated limits and keeping the alley between Front and First sts. clear of parked vehicles will probably be adopted.

Other business included the consideration of petitions requesting improvements and abatement of an open sewer in the area north of Harrison st., decision not to alter the present ordinance limiting card rooms to two and discussion of extending the lease of the American Legion on rooms in the city hall.

## Miller Is Found Guilty in Dallas

DALLAS, Feb. 8—Albert Miller of Independence, was found guilty by a Polk county circuit jury of negligent homicide here Friday. Time for sentence was set for Monday at 2 p. m. by Circuit Judge Arlie Walker.

The charge against Miller grew out of the death of Virginia Lee Fretwell last December from injuries received in an automobile accident in Independence, May 25, 1946. Miller was driving one of the cars involved in the accident in which several were injured and two girls eventually died. Nancy Temple of Eugene died in July and Virginia Lee Fretwell in December. A previous indictment was thrown out of court on the grounds that it did not cite a specific act of negligence.

## Speaker Martin Fears Communist Activity

WASHINGTON, Feb. 8—(AP)—Speaker Joe Martin pledged house republicans today to a drive to "remove the red menace from America."

Martin said in an interview his party will cooperate fully with the house committee on un-American activities. He reiterated his belief, expressed in a speech last week, that "a powerful and strategically-placed minority has set

out to destroy the American system and replace it with communism."
