## Massacre Subject of Speaker

Details of the Whiteman massacre may be gruesome but the original reports of that occurrence which set off the first of the Oregon country's Indian wars were forceful influences in the building of this state, Mrs. Carl Greve, Portland author who writes under the name of Alice Wheeler, told Salem Woman's club members and guests Saturday afternoon.

Wives of legislators, presidents of other women's organizations of the city and members of the executive board of the Salem Business and Professional Women's club were among the guests who gathered in the Valentine-decorated clubroom and later around the lace-spread tea table where tall tapers and a graceful arrangement of carnations carried further the Valentine motif. Dean Melvin Geist, accompanied by Mrs. Geist, sang a group of numbers.

Mrs. Greve, whose novels of the Oregon country have used material gathered by her for her own pleasure and for the records of the Oregon Historical society, spoke succinctly but with picturesque details of the occurrences on that November day in 1847 when Dr. Marcus Whitman, his wife and most of the adult employes of the mission near the present site of Walla Walla, Wash., were killed by Indians.

How the bringing of the measles and the reports of an eastern Indian of the destruction of other Indian tribes had aroused the previously peaceful neighbors of the Presbyterian mission, how a Catholic priest who stopped to pay a friendly call remained to read the burial

ceremony over one great common grave, how a lovely blond school teacher was offered a chieftain's homage if she would become his wife but chose instead to be ransomed and to live her life out as a Sheridan homemaker—these were among the incidents related by Mrs. Greve.
