

Camp Eyed as Possible Site For Hospital

A report that the Camp White hospital and 75 additional buildings are available as surplus property brought prompt action Monday from the state senate which adopted a resolution to send a five-man committee to southern Oregon to determine the feasibility of using the structures to supplement the state hospital.

Sen. Lew Wallace of Portland who introduced the resolution, reported that the buildings can be purchased at from 95 to 100 per cent discount.

In addition to the committee composed of two members of the senate and three members of the house of representatives, two other officials, John C. Evans, superintendent of the state hospital, and William C. Ryan, supervisor of state institutions, would be instructed to inspect the facilities. The group would report back to the legislature within 10 days.

The proposal preceded an attack by Sen. W. J. Pearson of Portland on delay in construction of buildings at the state hospital and other institutions.

Sen. Dean Walker of Independence, member of the state emergency board which has final authority in determining construction under the \$10,000,000 state building construction bill, expressed the opinion that building prices would decline sharply in the next 10 years and stated the state highway commission has noticed a slight decline in construction costs recently.

Committee Asks Favorable Action On Power Bill

The bill designed to encourage the Idaho Power company to build a \$10,000,000 dam on the Snake river held the do-pass recommendation of the house utilities committee today. The bill already has passed the senate.

The committee voted at a meeting at which representatives of the Bonneville administration, army engineers and peeples utility districts failed to show up to present objections.

Under existing law, the state can take over a power dam at any time two years after its completion. The bill would guarantee the power company that it could amortize its investment.

House Action

PASSED: (Rep. M. Wilson) — Would be part of first class school district withdrawal from union high school district's indebtedness.

HB 158 — (Com on labor indus.) — Raises from \$35 to \$50 the monthly benefits for permanent partial disability but without changing total payment.

HB 159 — (Com on labor indus.) — Bases lump sum payment for industrial deaths on actuarial practices instead of on American mortality table with interest of 2 instead of 4 per cent.

HB 271 — (Joint ways means com.) — Transfers to public assistance fund the \$200,000 balance of the revolving fund given public welfare commission for commodity stamps in 1941.

'Heroic' Work Held Need in School Crisis

Something "heroic" has to be done soon or Oregon's public education system will collapse, Rex Putnam, state superintendent of public instruction, told the house education committee Monday in discussing the bill to raise school teachers' annual minimum from \$1,200 to \$2,400.

Dr. Frank Parr, executive secretary of the Oregon Education association, which has requested the bill, said to raise the minimum to \$2,400 in reality would not double salaries, because practically all districts have been paying above the \$1,200 minimum.

Parr said the total cost of the bill would be \$1,235,000.

Senate Action

PASSED: — (Banking com.) — Permits person to release power of appointment, acquired through will, trust, or other instrument.

SB 129 — (Sen. Winslow and Rep. Ellis) — Empowers Tillamook county to erect buildings and memorials at Clatsop Plains Pioneer cemetery.

SB 145 — (Washington county del.) — Increases salaries of Washington county officials.

SB 192 — (Sen. Fattland et al.) — Increases salaries of Wheeler county officials.

SB 193 — (Sen. Chessman and Rep. Helberg) — Authorizes Clatsop county to erect buildings and memorials at Clatsop Plains Pioneer cemetery.

SB 194 — (Sen. Winslow and Rep. Ellis) — Authorizes Tillamook county to increase district attorney's total salary (state and county) from \$2500 to not more than \$3600.

HB 25 — (Game committee) — Prohibits borrowing of hunting and trapping licenses.

HB 65 — (Labor and Industries com.) — Provides that workmen's compensation wage of relatives hired by employer, to be used as basis for contribution to industrial accident fund, when relative resides with employer.

HB 100 — (Repealed with clerical amendments) — Increases salaries of Douglas county officers: Judge \$3000 to \$4000, treasurer \$2400 to \$3000, assessor \$3000 to \$3600, school supt. \$2700 to \$3200.

HB 122 — (Rep. Adams) — Increases salaries of Curry county officers: Judge \$2070 to \$2400, commissioners \$863 to \$1000, clerk \$2070 to \$2400, sheriff \$2070 to \$2400, school supt. \$1963 to \$2140, assessor \$1270 to \$2100.

HB 99 — (Rep. Wiley et al.) — Provides that territories transcending county lines which wish to incorporate as cities shall notify county court of county in which largest territory of new municipality would lie, with incorporation to be in that county.

HB 105 — (Repealed with clerical amendments) — Increases salaries of Josephine county officers: Judge \$2100 to \$2800, treasurer \$1800 to \$3000, clerk \$2100 to \$3000, sheriff \$2400 to \$3000, assessor \$2100 to \$3000.

HB 174 — (Rep. Ellis and Sen. Winslow) — Increases salaries of Tillamook county officers: Sheriff \$1500 to \$2400, judge \$2600 to \$3120, clerk \$2400 to \$2880, school supt. \$2400 to \$2880, commissioners \$7 to \$8.

HB 197 — (Joint ways and means committee) — Makes emergency appropriation of \$10,000 for administering Uniform Safety Responsibility act.

SJR 5 — (Sen. Walsh) — Calls for legislative committee of five to confer with other states regarding aviation control and coordination.

SJR 6 — (Sen. Wallace) — Appoints committee of five to investigate feasibility of acquiring Camp White facilities to relieve crowded conditions at state hospital.

DO-PASS REPORT: — **SB 47, 71, 72, 139**.

INTRODUCED: — **SB 221** — (Revision of laws com.) — Deletes section providing for legal succession of husband when two persons die simultaneously.

SB 222 — (Revision of laws com.) — Provides for proportional disposition of property when two or more beneficiaries or when insured and beneficiary die simultaneously, except when prior provision for such action has been made.

SB 223 — (Committee on county affairs) — Substitutes for SB 192, increases salaries of Marion county officers: Judge \$2500 to \$3840, commissioners \$2400 to \$3600, treasurer \$2100 to \$3000, clerk \$2400 to \$3240, assessor \$2400 to \$3600, school supt. \$2100 to \$3060. Salaries to be retroactive to Jan. 1, 1947.

SB 224 — (Committee on county affairs) — Substitutes for SB 133, increases salary of Salem district justice of the peace from \$3000 to \$3600 per year, retroactive to Jan. 1, 1947.

SB 225 — (Committee on county affairs) — Substitutes for SB 133, increases salaries of Salem district constable from \$2400 to \$3000, retroactive to Jan. 1, 1947.

SB 226 — (Committee on labor indus.) — Grants employers three days' grace before wages become payable in cases where employees are released due to the flow of seasonal produce. (Sen. Carson, A. Friends section of Oregon law pertaining to state hospital).

Measure Seeks New Powers for Attorney General

Additional powers are granted the state attorney general under provisions of a bill introduced in the senate Monday creating a department of justice and placing county district attorneys under direct control of the attorney general.

The bill would abolish the present system under which certain boards hire legal counsel independently of the attorney general's office.

Provision for the appointment of a deputy attorney general and an unlimited number of assistants is made.

The state police would continue as an independent organization, with the attorney general retaining his power to ask for investigations.

appointments of guardians to include attorneys within definition of "discreet persons."

SB 228 — (Sen. Mahoney) — Provides for retirement of district court judges who are adjudged permanently disabled after 20 years of service at an allowance of \$200 monthly.

SB 229 — (Judiciary com.) — Provides for a department of justice to be headed by the attorney general to handle all suits in which the state is involved; giving the attorney general the power to appoint a deputy and to control and direct at his own discretion the activities of county district attorneys.
