Lincoln Creed Reasserted by GOP Leaders

Republicans invoked the individual liberty creed of Abraham Lincoln last night and called for tax and expenditure slashing, a strong national defense, firm foreign policy, changes in tariff making, and an end of what one called "monopoly" of government.

The annual Lincoln day dinners brought out many oratorical bigwigs—many definitely among presidential prospects for 1948. Presidential politics bobbed up at Charleston, W. Va., where Senator Taft of Ohio spoke. A reporter asked Taft three times whether he is a candidate. Twice the senator replied, "I am definitely not a candidate." But the third time the senator's press aide, William D. McAdams, intervened: "He means he is not an 'active' candidate."

Taft, in advocating a "balanced" economy program, called for a reduction in taxes "by a sum equal to 20 percent of the personal income tax yield," or 3½ billion dollars. This differs from the across-the-board 20 percent slash in tax rates advocated by Chairman Knutson (R-Minn.) of the house ways and means committee.

Senate Leadership Requested By House Labor Committee

WASHINGTON, Feb. 12 (AP)—The house labor committee considering sweeping regulation of labor union activities served notice tonight that it won't act before the senate labor committee does. Chairman Hartley (R-NJ) of the house committee told reporters that his committee still is planning to have a labor bill ready for the house by March 15. He added, however, that it won't bring a bill to the floor until the senate labor committee does, because "it's about time they did a little leading over there." The house has passed labor bills in the past, Hartley recalled, only to have them shredded or killed in the senate. The day's developments included:

Testimony before the house labor committee by Mead J. Mulvihill, general counsel for the Pennsylvania State Brewers' association, that "terrorism and anarchy" has spread through the Pittsburgh area because of a "beer war" between AFL and CIO unions.

The CIO Economic Outlook published an accusation that greedy "monopoly interests" had brought about a crisis by forcing decontrol of wartime curbs on industry.

Forney Johnston, counsel for the National Coal association, told the senate labor committee that the tonnage royalty the government permits the United Mine Workers union to collect for a welfare fund is clearly unlawful. "Unless congress removes compulsory bargains and levies, he said, 'lights to the finish are not only likely but can be guaranteed.'"

Earl F. Reed, attorney for the Weirton Steel company, told the senate committee that the national labor relations board had tried "in every way" to wipe out an independent union at the company's plant in West Virginia. He said NLRB representatives attended secret meetings at which "CIO leaders paid bribes to offi-

cers of the independent union to induce them to betray it."

This brought a suggestion from Senator Morse (R-Ore) that the NLRB tell "its side of the story."

Storms in Pacific Force Ships Back

SEATTLE, Feb. 12 (AP)—Winty storms have pounded Pacific shipping the past few days, damaging two Japan-bound Seattle Liberty ships and sinking three landing craft in the San Francisco bay area.

The William Beaumont, which sailed from Olympia Monday with 9,500 tons of rock phosphate fertilizer for Japan was forced back here today. The S. M. Babcock, which left here Feb. 3 with a full load of wheat for the army in Japan, cut back into San Fran-
