Brandt, Dallas Creamery Co., was second with 94.17, and Gillette third with 93.5.

Payments cover 45 cents a rod for barbed wire and 65 cents a rod for woven wire. The practice applies to both eastern Oregon rangelands and to cut-over land pastures in western Oregon. No payments will be made for fences on crop land—just range land.
