The current exhibition of watercolors by Daniel Mendelowitz at Elfstrom Galleries enters its last week with closing day scheduled for Friday. Mendelowitz, associate professor of art at Stanford university has an unusual show of paintings expressing spirited, individual work although often low keyed and moody. It is not pretentious or sensational. The play of light, the fleeting mood of landscape, allows such challenges to the artist he strives to capture simply not by literal transcription but with a warmly understanding interpretation. With the viewers, the more popular paintings are "Morning, Inversion," "Two Boats Under Construction," "Reflections," "Old Barn, Autumn." Getting under way Saturday is an exhibit of old and new paintings by European and west coast artists.

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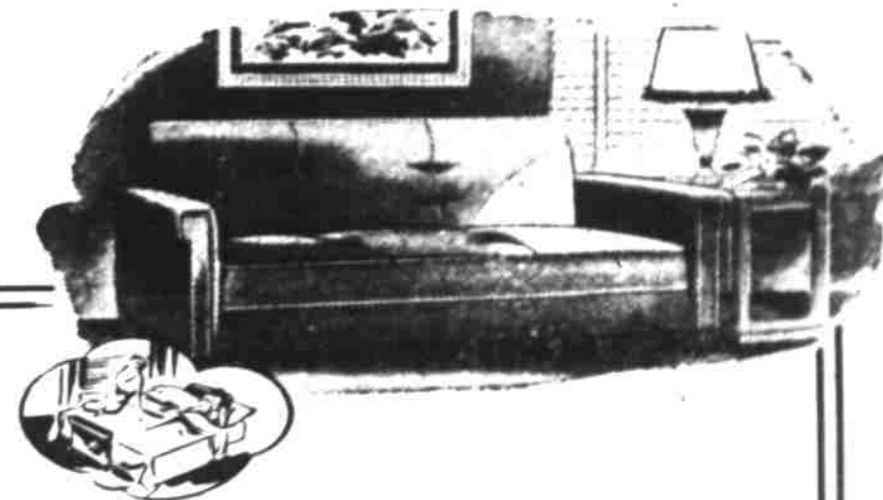
"Holly" Says
