Willamette Valley Improvement Projects Summarized in Report

Projects in the Willamette valley which would provide irrigation for 514,000 acres of land and make available 413,000 kilowatts of hydroelectric power capacity are included in the department of interior plans for development of land and water resources of the Columbia river and tributaries, as released this week.

Flood protection for Willamette valley cities and towns and 270,000 acres of farm land, and projects extending navigation, drainage and pollution abatement is planned. The increase in irrigated acreage would be about five times the existing area, the report states.

An average increase in gross returns of about \$35 per acre through irrigation is anticipated by the bureau of reclamation, which compiled the report. About 327,000 irrigable acres in 12 potential projects in the valley would be supplied from the seven reservoirs authorized for construction by the war department. Seven additional reservoirs, primarily for irrigation, would supply 187,000 acres in eight additional projects, the bureau reports.

Power Plants Planned
Authorized projects of the war department in the Willamette valley would permit establishments, at 13 sites, of power plants with an installed 413,000 kilowatts. On tributaries of the Willamette not affected by three enlarged flood control reservoirs, there are 21 potential power developments, the bureau reported.

The Willamette flood plain project includes that part of the Willamette valley which has been subject to flooding during the winter. It extends along each side of the river from Eugene to Canby and for short distances along some of the tributaries.

Plans for improvement of the Willamette river for modern river transportation from Oregon City to Albany and shallow draft boats to Eugene have been prepared by the war department. Improvement of the "badly polluted" condition of the river, especially below Salem, would be improved by the proposed increase in minimum flow for navigation, the bureau indicated.

Reservoirs Listed
Reservoirs are proposed for the following locations in the valley: Dorena to cost \$4,000,000; Lookout Point (Pleasant Hill), \$100,000; Cottage Grove, \$1,650,000; Quartz Creek (Springfield and Coburg), \$860,000 and \$3,940,000; Fern Ridge (East Long Tom and West Long Tom), \$1,000,000 and \$600,000; Sweet Home (Albany and Scio), \$12,000,000; Detroit (Stavton and Salem), \$1,200,000 and \$9,400,000; Holley (Brownsville), \$3,500,000; Hoskins (Independence), \$2,000,000; Pelkey (Canby), \$300,000.

Potential power plants in the valley include Lookout Point, Black Canyon, Quartz Creek, Bear Creek, Vida, Leeburg, Deerborn, Waltersville, Hayden Bridge, Detroit, Niagara, Mill City and Mehama.

UNION HILL — The March meeting of the grange will be tonight for both the subordinate and juvenile granges.

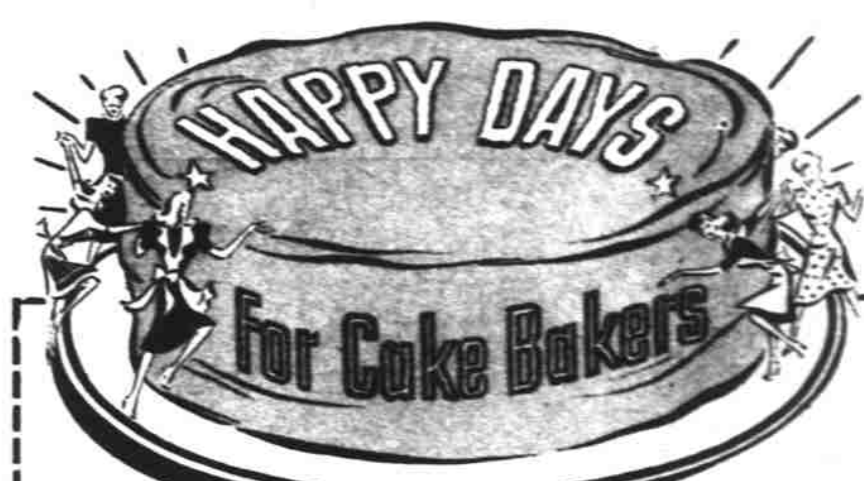
The Future Farmers class of the Silverton high school will have charge of the lecturer's 8.30 program. Leonard Hudson is FFA instructor from Silverton high school.
