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
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
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SPANISH BUN CAKE

Cream wafers — 1 cup shortening
 Add and beat well — 2 cups brown sugar
 2 egg yolks
 1 teaspoon vanilla
 Set together and add to above — 2 1/2 cups Crown Cake Flour
 1 teaspoon soda
 1 teaspoon baking powder
 1 teaspoon salt
 1/2 teaspoon cinnamon
 1/2 teaspoon cloves

Liquid — 1 cup sour milk
 Fold in — 2 egg whites, beaten
 Place in greased pan, 10 x 12 x 2, sprinkle 1 cup chopped nuts over batter.
 Fold together — 3 egg whites, beaten
 1 cup brown sugar
 Spread over top of cake batter, bake at 350 degrees F. for one hour.

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
