Smacks of Salt

Market Has Fine Display of Fish for Early Spring Eating; Recipes Given

Early isn't the only day fish is eaten, nor is Lent the only season. This is attested by the fact that the fish market is a busy place every day of the week.

I like to look over the stock and visualize what it will look like when it's browned and served with sauce, or when combined with potatoes to make salad.

We are lucky to have fresh fish all the year round and often I wonder if we appreciate it fully.

This week there's an imposing array of smoked salmon beginning to appear, and I thought I'd like to still have them a meal of meat would be a few steaks, some applesauce, too, also an extra hot fish to bake or broil.

Fresh smelt is still in the market and will be served at special times during this season. Halibut is down to its frozen. The fish is nice cut though and a little fresh need not be a detriment.

Long cod appears in the display, too, in fillet of sole. Several other fish are not always to be found on the market. Smoked or kippered salmon, tips come from the finest part of the fish and have excellent flavor. The meat may be flaked and creamed, combined with salad or arranged in a sandwich. It's good just served in the thick as any cold fish.

Finnan haddock, also in the market now, is a popular delicacy in fish eating communities. Best way of cooking is to let soak a few hours in milk, then poach gently in a little wine. The milk may be thickened slightly and seasoned, or served over the fish just as is.

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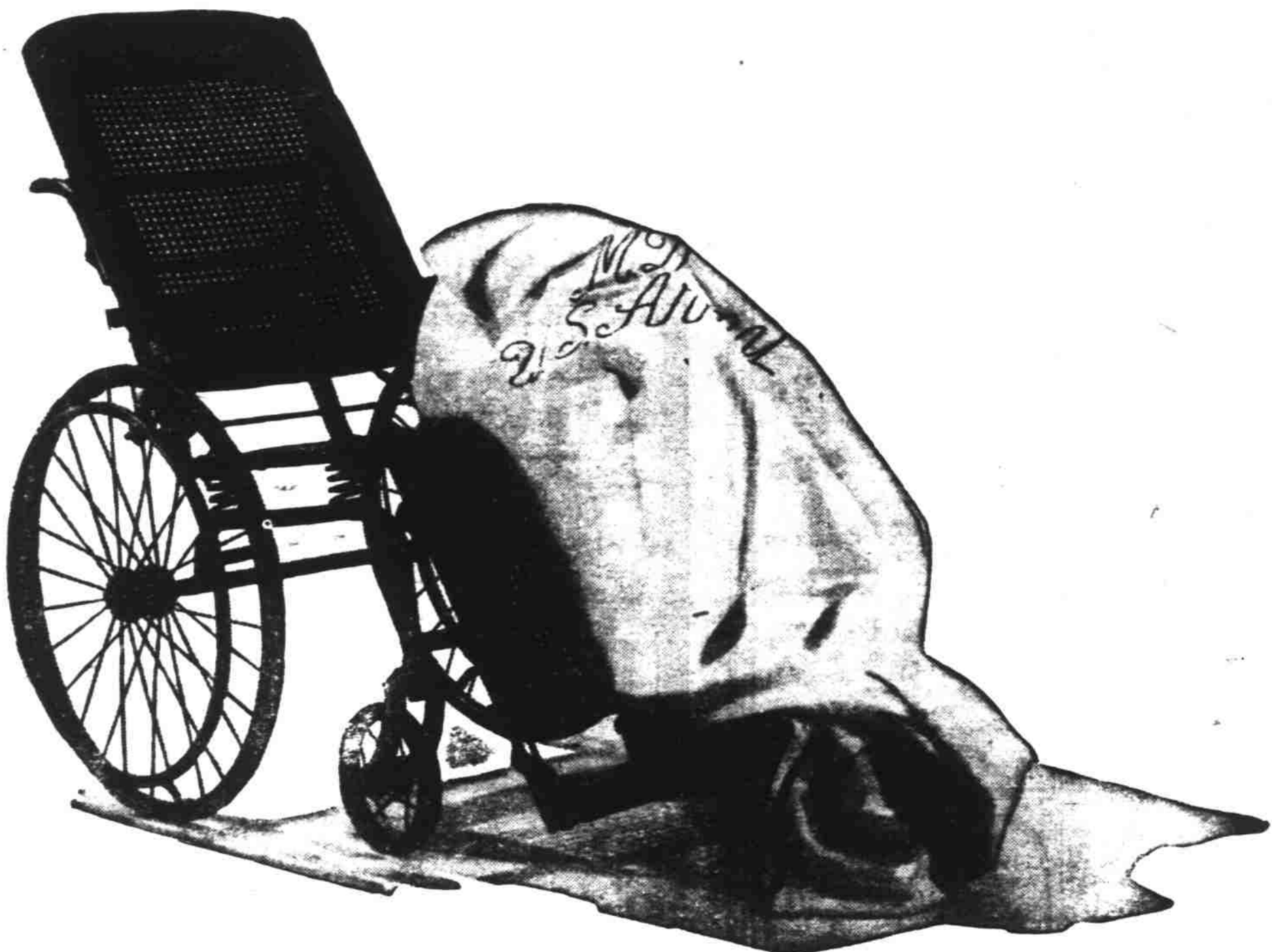
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
