Telephone Company Continues to Offer to Arbitrate

Telephone Employees Get Good Pay

Employees of the Pacific Telephone and Telegraph Company are well paid and their wages compare favorably with those paid by other concerns in the community for work requiring similar skill and training.

The Pacific Telephone and Telegraph Company is still trying in every way to avoid a telephone strike.
