Tongue Talk

Boiled Tongue, Fresh or Cured Make Inexpensive Meats for Spring Menus

All meats aren't in the higher brackets, for certain of the really fine flavored cuts can serve the family at a reasonable price. Take tongue for instance. A tongue that costs well under a dollar can serve the whole family once hot, and come back at least once cold.

Smoked or fresh, tongue is good in flavor and if the family likes it, ten to one they like it a lot. Cook fresh tongue in plenty of salted water, closely covered, for anywhere from one and a half to three hours, according to size and age. When skin will slip off easily, slip it off, then let the tongue cool in the liquid in which cooked.

If you wish, you may serve it warm, sliced with a piquant sauce or with horseradish, or you can cook it further in the following

manner: Put in a heavy kettle, add ½ cup vinegar, half cup raisins, ½ cup corn syrup and one cup stock, ¼ teaspoon each cinnamon and cloves. Cook ¾ of an hour, turning once when half done. Serve with this sauce.

The tongue may be served with the following sauce, when still hot. Simmer 1 cup of the broth with 1 cup tart jelly (current or berry), 8 whole cloves and 1 lemon, sliced fine. Serve hot over tongue.

Another fine sauce for tongue (or ham) is made by adding ½ teaspoon prepared horseradish to a glass of tart jelly and stirring the jelly will break down and become syrupy.

Use the remaining broth as soup stock, it's delicious.

Cold tongue can be made into sandwiches, cut into julienne strips and added to a green salad, or be served simply sliced on a platter. Thinly sliced tongue can be added to rice casseroles or macaroni dishes, or can be warmed with a vegetable or scalloped with a vegetable.

Tongue sizes vary, the little lamb's tongues, only enough for two or three servings, are very inexpensive and have excellent flavor. Large beef tongues can be found to almost any size. Remember, color is only skin deep on a tongue so if your meat man sends a black tongue think nothing of it, it's the same color as the white when the skin is removed.
