

Corn Weak on Board of Trade

CHICAGO, April 17—(AP)—Corn weakened on the Board of Trade today following announcement that the local Commodity Credit Corporation was out of the cash market. Prices dropped as much as 3 cents at one time, but a late rally reduced these losses. Wheat finished ¼ lower to 1¼ higher. May 32.59-¼, corn was 4-1¼ lower, May 1.78-½, and oats were ¼ lower to ¼ higher, May 89-¼.

Wheat opened strong on overnight dispatches from Washington quoting agriculture department officials as expecting a continued high level of exports during the coming crop year. Later, the grain was depressed by further reports of improvement in the winter wheat crop outlook.

The police said they had been told the hide-out was equipped with rations for six months. It is in virgin fish and game country on the north slopes of Euchre mountain.

Waterman was wounded last week as he attempted to serve a warrant, charging insanity, on Boyd Bennett, Siletz Indian, who later disappeared from Siletz Indian agency.

Stocks Follow Varied Trend

NEW YORK, April 17—(AP)—Selected stocks continued their recovery in today's market but many leaders stumbled and a late rally, sparked by reports the telephone union had cut its wage demands, failed to follow through.

Transfers of 700,000 shares compared with 900,000 the day before, were a low for a full stretch since last Thursday.

The Associated Press 60-stock composite was off .1 of a point at 61.3.

Union Pacific was up 1 1/2 at 122 1/2, Great Northern Railway 1 1/4 at 41 1/4 and U. S. Gypsum 1 1/4 at 96. In the plus column were Pullman, Youngstown Sheet, Goodyear and Woolworth.

Douglas Aircraft dropped 3 1/2 at 64 as the company's president painted a somewhat gloomy picture of earnings. Monsanto Chemical common lost 2 at 52 and the preferred was off 2 1/4 at 112 3/4 following destruction of the concern's Texas city plant.
