Foresters Plan 'Destructive **Cutting' Probe**

The state forestry board Thursday launched a study of discrepancies in state and federal estimates of destructive forest cutting practices in Oregon.

Sparking the special committee study, ordered by the board at its quarterly meeting in Salem, was a request by George T. Gerlinger, Dallas timber operator, who pointed out that although the state board's Oregon report esti-mated 8½ per cent destructive cutting, the federal forest service estimate for Oregon and Washington showed a 75 per cent fig-

State Forester Nels Rogers said he believed the difference was caused by varying definitions of "destructive cutting," but that the same as approved by the state and the federal government. In other matters, Rogers esti-

mated the new timber tax of 5 per cent per 1,000 board feet would net the state about \$300,000 during the first year, 40 per cent going to the forestry department and the remainder to the Oregon forest research laboratory for wood-waste utilization research.

The board appropriated \$5,000 for the Keep Oregon Green organization and approved all 1947 budgets for forest protection districts of the state.


County Deaths. **Births Counted**

A total of 258 births, 139 boys and 119 girls, occurred in Marion county in March, bringing the year's total to date up to 728, the county health department reported Thursday at the monthly meeting of its executive board in the local health office.

Forty-three men, 33 women and 4 infants under one month died last month bringing the 1947 death toll to date to 217. Heart disease was the highest cause of death with 20 lister, cancer caused 12, apoplexy and congenital diseases took six each and kidney disease caused eight deaths.

During March the health department admitted to service 74 communicable disease patients, 14 venereal disease-patients and 50 tuberculosis cases. It conducted 995 school hygiene inspections and 51 adult hygiene classes.
