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War and Romance, in Paraguay

Those who think of the civil war in Paraguay as a muster of starving, ragged peasants revolting against the oppressive regime at Asuncion, the capital and struggling in the intense heat of near-tropical jungles against the government armies do not know all the facts about it. An AP story from Rip de Janiero gives the war a far more colorful and romantic picture. A glamorous woman spy, love at first sight and then the heartbreak spice the news of the revolution. As reported by the Brazilian news agency from the border town of Ponta Pora the story attaches unusual romance to the fighting. If circulated through Paraguay it might result in a swelling of the ranks of the rebels in hopes of fresh spy invasions, or else break up the present revolutionary force out of sheer embarrassment.

The narrative deserves a reprint:
"There was in this city for a few days a Paraguayan government woman spy, who mysteriously disappeared, leaving the rebels at Pedro Juan Caballero frantic.
"She was an enchanting woman, always wearing expensive, scandalous dresses, and pretended to be an ardent rebel.
"The first moment she arrived here in Ponta Pora, she immediately contacted the rebels, becoming the mistress of an important rebel leader who is the best-dressed man on this frontier.
"She used to visit constantly in Ponta Pora telegraph station, talking with the telegrapher and all persons who sent telegrams.
"Selma la Terrible—as the rebels used to call her—was always insisting upon going to Concepcion to have an opportunity to speak over the radio, 'Voice of Victory.' Finally she got permission to speak on the radio. Her speech was censored. However, Selma read the speech as originally written, especially emphasizing 'phrase 16.'

"Sought by police in order to explain why she disobeyed censor's instructions, Selma was not found in Concepcion, Pedro Juan Caballero or Ponta Pora. Only then did the rebels discover her true mission. She was sent by the Paraguay government to spy on rebel activities and send military information. This authentic Paraguayan Mata Hari caused a tremendous sensation among the rebels, principally her lover."

Bow to Public Health Nurses

We mustn't let the week pass without a bow to the profession of the public health nurses for whom the week is tagged. People of Marion county can do this with ease and grace because they are quite familiar with what these nurses do. Those who are do not need information like this:

Six public health nurses are employed by the county health department. Each nurse serves a district of the county. The nurses help mothers and babies, conducting educational campaigns with mothers, holding baby clinics and doing a great deal to protect the health of mothers and infants. It is because of efforts of the public health nurse, in considerable degree, that the rates of infant and maternal mortality are low in this county and state.

The public health nurses assist in the health examinations of children, give immunization against infectious diseases, make checks to isolate cases of tuberculosis, and to protect against venereal disease. They help school teachers in matters of school health; and carry the gospel of good health wherever they go.

Here we have one public health nurse for some 15,000 people, while the ideal program calls for one to every 2,000. Either our people are too healthy to require so many nurses or our nurses are super-nurses to be able to do the job. Anyhow we owe a great deal to these nurses in the blue uniforms who reach into homes where emergency care is needed, who stick needles into youngsters to spare them from whooping cough, who fluoroscope suspects to apprehend TB in its early stages, and do many other things "in line of duty." The results show in our records of disease and mortality.

Spilling the Dirt

Whether done as threat or bluff the assertion that ex-Congressman May could spill some dirt on "campaign contributions" involving "high party figures and members of congress" is enough to make Washington, and the rest of the country, prick up its ears. May's attorney said at the trial now in progress that if the government pushes its quizz in the matter of two \$1000 checks that went to May he will have his client "tell all."

That indeed is an invitation which the people hope the government prosecutor will accept. Anyone with a nose for scandal will sniff at such a prospect.

It is recalled that Senator Bilbo (who still draws his salary though he has never returned to Washington to claim his seat) collected campaign and church contributions from war contractors suddenly generous with money where politicians were concerned. Bilbo made hints of similar disclosures if he were pressed too much. In fact it is intimated that one reason for preventing Bilbo from being sworn in was to keep him from having the right to speak in his defense on the senate floor.

With all the billions being tossed around as they were during the war it will not be surprising if a good many thousand dollars didn't go to grease the ways if not the palms of those in positions of influence or authority. We deplore the waste; but we cannot excuse corruption. If May has a story to tell, let him tell it, on the witness stand for the world to hear.

The Idaho cowboy who killed his boss was sentenced to life imprisonment by the judge at Vale. The lady who pushed him to do it got the same sentence; so they will have a long time to think things over out at the end of State street. The suspicion is that the woman in the case had her eye chiefly on the victim's fortune, so she can testify anew that "crime doesn't pay."

One can't complain of the conduct of the pickets at the telephone building in Salem. Lately they have just stuck the placard in the parking and sat their watch out in an automobile. Why grow bunnions to give notice of a strike with which the public is already familiar.

Salem Lutheran Church Observes Synod Centenary

St. John's Lutheran church will observe Sunday, April 27 the 100th anniversary of the founding of the Lutheran Missouri synod with which it is a part. It is the largest individual synod of the Lutheran faith and now has 1,564,000 adherents growing from 10 congregations and 4000 members when formed April 28, 1847.

Present numerical strength is concentrated in the Central and Midwestern states but has churches and missions in every state of the union as well as in Canada, Alaska, Mexico, Cuba, the Hawaiian Islands, England, Panama and South America.

Misouri synod is divided into 33 districts each of which elects its own officers and control its own internal affairs.

The three Canadian districts have a membership of 44,000, while the two South American districts have 65,000 members enrolled. Foreign mission work is carried on in India, China, Africa, and the Philippine Islands. Some 4000 active pastors and missionaries are on the synod's roster, while 1900 ministerial students are enrolled in its colleges.

More than 1000 congregations maintain their own full-time Christian schools. These are attended by 80,000 pupils, who are taught by 2500 teachers.
