Lillie Madsen cies in the rock garden. For pest control on all rhododendrons, he advises the use of arsenic of lead for all chewing insects and to be sure to spray on the underside of the leaves. Another suggestion is to put some weevil bait on the ground just before strawberry time for this weavil. (Ed.'s note: If you haven't already done this, do so at once.)

"If you want a real rhododendron why not get a Brittania," says Barkus, "We of the rhododendron society are inclined to think this variety is one of the top reds. Some of our valley nurserymen have quite a goodly supply of this variety. Until recently it was difficult to find because of its limited supply."
