Penalty for Tree Stealing Defined

Tex Foxley, attorney for the state forestry department, Tuesday held that taking a tree from someone else's land constitutes larceny with a penalty of from one to 10 years in the state penitentiary if the value of the products exceeds \$35.

The law provides that in case of innocent trespass the injured person may collect double damages while in case of intentional trespass the charge is treble damages.
