NEW YORK, May 10 (AP)—The stock market today finished a generally losing week with mild irregularities prevailing in one of the slowest and narrowest sessions of the past several years. The Associated Press 60-stock composite was up .1 of a point Saturday, at 62.1 but on the week showed a net loss of .9 of a point. On the day Lion Oil was up 2¼ at 49¼, a new 1947 high, in future response to a splitup proposal. Allied Chemical added ¼ at 170½ and Union Pacific 1 at 128½. Wilson & Co. tacked on ½ at 12½ in the wake of a raised quarterly. Improved were General Motors, Santa Fe, N. Y. Central, Great Northern Railway, Standard Oil (N.J.), United Aircraft, Glenn Martin, Goodyear, American Telephone, Western Union "A," Kennecott, Anaconda and General Electric.

Grain Forecast Causes Decline

CHICAGO, May 10 (AP)—Forecast for a billion bushel wheat crop and unconfirmed trade rumors that the government might accept a later date for acceptance of cash wheat caused grains to decline sharply on the board of trade today. The May wheat contract broke more than 5 cents at one time, but a short-covering movement at the close regained all but a cent of this loss.
