

Salem Quartet, Nine Soloists Rate 'Superior'

Nine soloists and one quartet received superior ratings among Salem senior and junior high school musicians performing in national competition at Ellensburg, Wash., over the weekend. It was announced Monday by Vernon Wiscarson, school music supervisor here.

First division (superior) ratings were awarded the high school French horn quartet composed of Glen Garrett, Barbara Owens, Mary Swigart and Eldon Caley; Parrish soloists, Buddy Lindstrand, tuba, and Lepton Gilson, bassoon; and senior high soloists Bernice Kleiberg, soprano; Daryl Peters, trombone; Don Beala, baritone; Frances Baum, piano; Robert Miller, Oboe; Roger Middleton, cornet, and Glen Garrett, French horn.

Other divisions of the judging were the second or "excellent" and third or "good" divisions. More than 1,200 musicians from schools in three northwest states participated. Wiscarson said.

Four Sunday burglaries investigated by city police show a break in which a calf was killed and kidnapped and include one where thieves broke into a church to rob "penny" banks.

E. C. McCandlish reported a 6-week-old Guernsey calf, weighing about 150 pounds, was killed and taken from the Salem Meat company at 25th and Mission streets. The animal was valued at about \$30.

"Penny" bank loot from the Calvary Baptist church at Miller and Liberty streets amounted to about \$15, the church reported. Three banks were emptied and desk drawers were rifled and pried throughout the building in attempts to obtain more money, police said.

Mr. and Mrs. Roy Peterson awakened late Sunday night in their home at 161 Luther st., a flashlight shining in their faces. As Peterson arose the light and a burglar who took \$40 from the purses left through a rear door without being seen very clearly, police said. Scout Executives In Training Here

New Cell Block Approved for State Prison

Construction of a \$600,000 cell block at the state penitentiary, with 360 steel-reinforced concrete cells, was approved by the state board of control Monday. A new wall at the prison, to cost \$175,000, also received approval of the board.

Before construction can start the state emergency board would have to approve, since most of the money for the two projects would come out of the \$10,000,000 state building fund authorized by the voters at a special election two years ago. The 1945 legislature appropriated \$120,000 for the cell block and \$100,000 for the proposed new wall.

Officials said the emergency board probably would be called into session early in June as the appropriations must be obligated before June 30 or they will revert to the general fund of the state.

Prison Warden George Alexander had recommended that the new cell block be constructed of concrete to accommodate 720 men in four-man cells, at a cost of about \$300,000. The board of control decided it would be better to have one man to each cell.

Plans for four foreign war state training school for boys near Woodburn were accepted by the board but bids for construction will not be solicited until later. These include a dwelling, boys' cottage, gymnasium and school building to cost a total of \$343,000.

Slated for construction in the near future is a laundry building at the Fairview home.

He was born in Janesville, Minn., Jan. 29, 1883 and married Jennie Bailey, who survives, in 1907. The couple later moved to North Dakota and came here in 1928. He went to The Dalles 14 years ago to manage the hospital there.

Surviving are his wife and two daughters, Mrs. Tucker of Salem and Mrs. Luzerne W. Smith of Portland; a sister, Winifred Owens of Grand Forks, N. D., and five grandchildren, Mary Helen and Linda Smith, both of Portland; Gene Ann, Jane and William Tucker, all of Salem.

The funeral will be at 2 o'clock today at Clough-Barrick chapel, the Rev. Seth Huntington officiating. Interment will be at Belcrest Memorial park.

Bruce Fox, 64, Dies of Illness

Bruce Fox, 64, a 40-year resident and dairyman of the Liberty district, died Monday morning at a Salem hospital after several months' illness.

Snell Leaves To Fight Cut In West Fund

Gov. Earl Snell left Monday by airplane for Washington, D.C., where he and other western governors will appear before a senate committee considering western reclamation appropriations.

"It certainly is timely for the western states to consolidate their forces in vigorous protest to the indiscriminate slashing of federal funds for reclamation, power development, navigation and flood control projects in the west," Gov. Snell declared prior to his departure.

"While I endorse wholeheartedly the policy of economy in all branches of federal government service I do not feel that the bulk of the budget reductions should center on the western states," he added.

The governor stressed that pow-

er development projects are not only self-liquidating but also bear interest charges, bring about industrial development and employment, and contribute to the general welfare, growth and prosperity of the communities and the nation.
