Under Pressure

Vegetable Cooking Methods Again Discussed; Pressure Cooker Safe

Over the telephone wires this morning I heard a statement which really astounded and worried me. A very young voice, calling about time for blanching asparagus, remarked that she was using her boiler for canning. I mentioned the danger, asked if she had a pressure cooker. Her reply was: "My mother always cans her's this way, and anyway, I'm using glass lids, there's no danger with them."

I was surprised that so young a woman would be using her mother's old, unsafe method, but was doubly surprised that she thought glass lids were the only way to get perfect seals.

Now for years persons dealing with information on canning have been working away at discouraging women with the dangerous practice of canning non-acid vegetables, meats and fish without a pressure cooker. We thought we had them pretty well convinced. We thought, too, that those women who are so sure that the old way mamma did it is the best, at least had read enough to know that a perfect seal can be had with other than glass lids and that no amount of glass will insure their vegetables being free of poison if it happens to be there.

The safest way to put down vegetables is to freeze them, then next safest is to can properly under pressure. Follow the rules in an up-to-date canning book, or call the home demonstration agent's office or us, for the time

required in pressuring them. Be sure your pressure cooker gauge is accurate or that you know how many degrees it is off. Asparagus, the only vegetable being put down in large quantities now, should be blanched not over two minutes in boiling water, and chilled if to be frozen. A minute or two more if to be canned. Be sure you do not put much asparagus in the kettle at one time as it takes too long for the water to come back to boiling. In canning, allow ½ teaspoon salt for pints and 1 teaspoon for quarts of asparagus. Cook at 10 pounds pressure for 25 minutes for pints and 35 minutes for quarts. You can use the same water in which blanched to fill jars if not gritty.

Use any good jar, but be sure there are no rough edges to spoil seal.
