

# Court Rules Habitual to Complete Term

Marion County Circuit Judge George Duncan's decision that released Ted Macomber from the state penitentiary a year ago was reversed Tuesday by the state supreme court. Macomber was ordered returned to prison to serve the remaining 35 years of a 40-year sentence for being a habitual criminal according to law.

Macomber's present whereabouts are unknown, state officials said. After having served sentences for grand larceny and assault with intent to rob, Macomber was convicted in Polk county of grand larceny in 1939 and sentenced to a term of five years. In addition, since it was his third felony, Circuit Judge Arlie Walker of the

Polk county circuit court sentenced him to 40 years as a habitual criminal. At the expiration of his five-year sentence for grand larceny last year, Macomber filed suit for habeas corpus in Judge Duncan's court on grounds that the habitual criminal proceedings were irregular. The writ was granted by Judge Duncan who ordered Macomber's release.

A revue of Willamette university's progress during the past five years plus a peek at the college's future were presented by President G. Herbert Smith at the Junior Chamber of Commerce luncheon Tuesday. Projects on Willamette's schedule include an added class building on the present Sweetland field site, an adequate chapel and auditorium, a student union to house campus activities and an increase in Willamette's endowment from \$2,000,000 to \$5,000,000, he said.

An enrollment of 1,100 students next fall was forecast by President Smith. He emphasized, however, that the university would continue to limit the enrollment to the number "that we can take care of adequately."

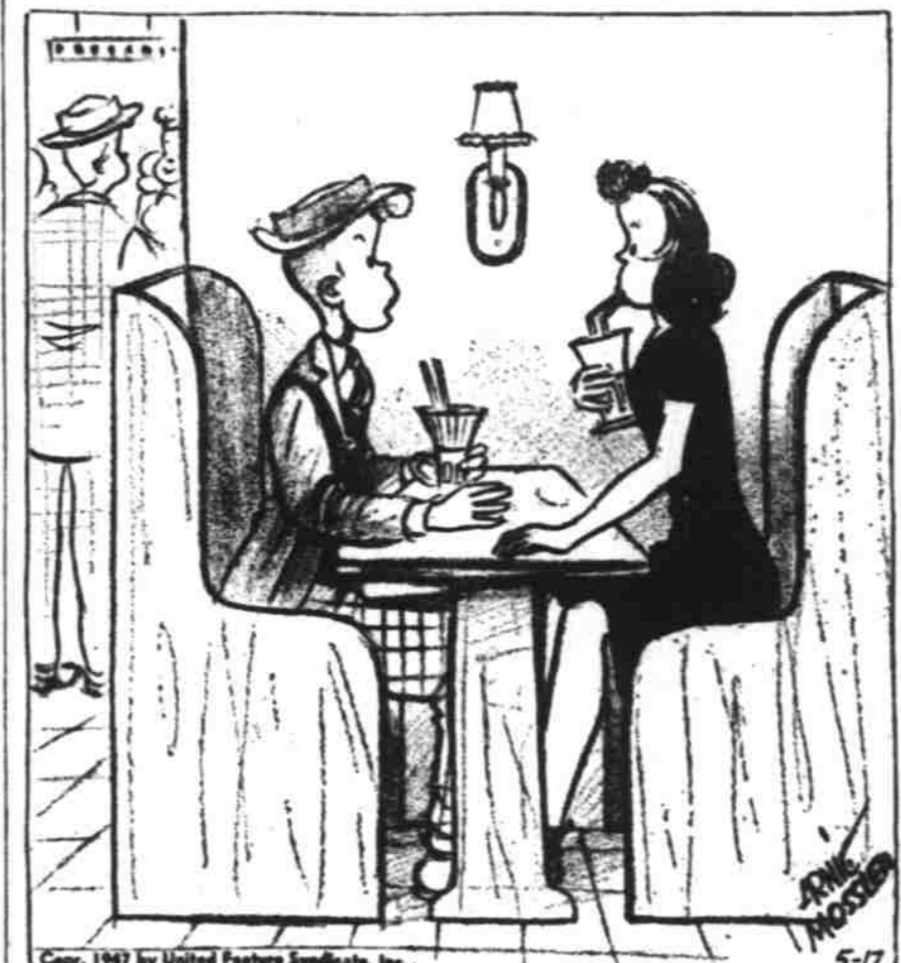
# Andrew J. Browning, 66, Portland Eye Specialist and Past President of the Western Ophthalmological Society, Died Here Today.

## Wheat, Corn Up 5 Cents

CHICAGO, May 20—(AP)—Wheat and corn advanced as much as five cents a bushel on the board of trade today on talk of damage to the winter wheat crop in sections of Texas, and government purchase of corn for livestock feeding in European countries. At the finish wheat was 3 to 5 cents higher than the previous close, May \$2.75-2.74 1/2. Corn was 2 1/2 to 5 1/2 higher, May \$1.84-1.84 1/2. Oats were 1/4 to 2 cents higher, May 96 1/2.

## Stocks Attempt Recovery Bid

NEW YORK, May 20—(AP)—Stocks struggled toward recovery on an individual basis today although many stock market leaders found the going a bit tough and reverted to the minus column. The Associated Press 60-stock composite managed to retain an advance of .1 of a point at 58.7. Pleasing dividends lifted American Export Lines 1 at 18 1/2 and Keystone Steel 1/4 at 41 1/2. Chrysler was up 1 1/2 at 95 1/2. International Harvester 1 1/2 at 79 1/2, Southern Pacific 1 1/2 at 36 1/2, Union Pacific 1 at 124, Continental Oil 1 at 38 1/2, and American Woolen 1 1/2 at 31.
