Out of the Henhouse

Lazy Hens Make Good Sunday Dinner And Spring's Good Time for Eating

Farmer wives, culling out the old hens or those who simply won't work to make room for the dear little ones soon to take their place in the hen house, will include chicken on the Sunday dinner menu for several weeks to come.

The large meaty pieces of the heavy hens really make delicious eating when served Maryland style.

CHICKEN MARYLAND
Cut up the larger chicken into handy sizes for eating. Season with salt, dip into egg and milk (one egg to a cup of milk), then roll in fine crumbs.
Heat 1/4 inch of fat in the skillet, brown the chicken and then add two cups hot milk and cover. Bake for about two hours in a 350 degree oven, or less if chicken is younger or more tender. Take off the lipper to allow before done, to crisp meat and brown surface. Cornbread is a favorite accompaniment in the south.

Here's a version of fried chicken, for older fowl.
COUNTRY FRIED CHICKEN
Cover pieces of chicken with hot water, season. Simmer until tender, dip pieces in flour or crumbs, fry crisp in 1/4 inch fat in a heavy skillet. When brown, remove chicken from pan, make gravy using water (with 3 table-spoons flour to each 2 cups liquid). Serve gravy with the fowl.
