Hello Again

Strawberry Jam Uses Some Precious Sugar, But Many Cooks Think Worth It

Sugar situation looking up as it is, makes us a little more hopeful when we spare some sugar for preserves, and strawberries of course are top favorite for preserves.

Here's a luscious old favorite I haven't dared put into print for many a year, but here it is.

STRAWBERRY GOOSEBERRY JAM

1 pound strawberries
1 1/2 pound gooseberries
2 pounds sugar

Slice berries and cover with sugar. Let stand one hour and add gooseberries and cook until the mixture jells when a little is cooled in a saucer.

Then there's this:
STRAWBERRY PRESERVES
1 quart berries
1 quart sugar
1/2 cup water

Add half sugar to the water and cook until almost caramelized. Add berries and then remaining sugar, raw. Bring to a boil and cook 12 to 15 minutes. Do not stir, merely push berries into syrup. Let stand overnight in a
