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Tax Cut in Sight

Agreement between senate and house conferees on the text of a bill reducing income taxes was speedily effected. Approval of both houses is anticipated on Monday.

Those who believe in soaking the rich claim the bill is one to give succor to the wealthy taxpayer. The married person, no dependents, with a net income of \$1500 gets a reduction of \$28.50.

The truth is that the tax rates are steeply graduated, the proportionate penalties increasing with the size of the incomes; and the tax cuts are inversely graduated.

This bill is only temporary legislation. The house ways and means committee is starting work on a thorough-going revision of the tax structure.

The total cost of the present bill to the treasury will be \$4 billion. While the appropriations are not yet made, the republican leadership seems confident that this cut can be made and still leave a balance of \$2.6 billion for debt reduction.

Early Scrimmage

The rival teams are lining up for the biennial "classic". It isn't football, though the date is October 7.

In the opposition are groups such as the labor unions, the state grange and farmers' union. However, when the grange holds its state convention in Bend next week a big argument is expected on this issue.

A few days ago, Rep. Lyle Thomas of Polk county, who led the fight in the house against a sales tax, spoke over a Portland radio station against the measure.

Supporters of the sales tax are getting their team organized, too. Offices have been set up in the Dekum building, Portland.

This is an "off year" in politics. But this sales tax fight will be warm enough to attract a lot of public attention.

Promotion for Old Name

The "Hunt" name is an old and respected name in food canning on this coast. The organization bearing that name was launched in 1890 as Hunt Brothers Fruit Packing Co.

Part of the 56th annual report of Hunt Foods which shows in figures and in charts the company's expansion. Sales in 1946 amounted to over \$48 million of which over half went to buy raw products and nearly one-sixth for wages and salaries.

Of particular note is the fact that the new management has become an aggressive advertiser of its brand name "Hunt". It uses newspapers, magazines, billboards and radio in its promotion campaigns.

outstanding, callable at 10 1/2% during the year beginning July 1, 1947 at a rate of 10 1/2%.

All this is preliminary to the big question of what is to happen to the common stock ownership of Pacific. Now in the hands of American Power & Light, it is due for transfer because of the "death sentence" law on holding companies.

This merger is thus just a preliminary step to the "jump-off". What is awaited with interest is the announcement as to disposition of the common stock holdings in Pacific and the subsidiaries of American in the northwest.

Tony Perkins, Mail Carrier For 31 Years to Retire

After 31 years of service as the Aumsville rural carrier for the post office department Tony T. Perkins is retiring June 1.

The route now covers 48 miles with 300 boxes and the May mail was 30,000 pieces.

Perkins used a team and buggy for several years. In those days the roads were so bad he "time and again" unhitched his horses from the buggy, drove them out onto solid ground, then tied a heavy 30-foot rope, "carried for that purpose," to the buggy and pulled it out, then would hitch up and go on again.

Mr. and Mrs. Perkins have sold their home in Aumsville to J. W. Bethel of North Santiam and are planning a trip to Virard, Oregon, on the eastern coast to visit family and friends. They then intend to return to the place they've purchased on the Sandy-Mt. Hood highway and build. Mr. Robert Mickey is the present substitute mail carrier.
