

Hawkins & Roberts, Inc. Divides Departments into Three Firms

Liquidation of Hawkins & Roberts, Inc., which this weekend divided into three independent firms with headquarters still in the Guardian building, was voted by the stockholders last fall and has proceeded to payment in full of the investments of preferred and common stockholders. The business was started in 1913 as a partnership of Harry Hawkins and T. A. Roberts. It was incorporated in 1916. Offices were maintained in the Oregon building for many years, and more recently in the Guardian building. The firm handled city and farm loans for Prudential, engaged actively in the real estate and property management business. For some years branch offices were maintained at other points in the valley. Officers of the corporation were Harry Hawkins, president, T. A. Roberts, vice president, and the late Frank H. Spears, secretary. About 1930 Hawkins removed to Portland where he became president of Commonwealth, Inc. Lightens Responsibility

"We decided to liquidate in order to lighten our load of responsibility," said Roberts. "This has been a steady grind for me for over 30 years and I want to have a little time to relax. I will still have my interests here to look after but will be relieved of the duties that went with the corporation."

"In the depression years we had to take over and look after many properties. At one time we had 240 farms to manage. Whenever we could we encouraged the former owners to stay on the place and it has been a matter of great satisfaction to see how many of them have paid off their contracts, regained title to their land and accumulated cash in the bank. We feel that our faith in the land and in the people has been rewarded."

Association Increases Space

Salem Federal Savings and Loan association will have about double its former office space and double its vault space, stated Keith Powell, president. The association handles savings accounts of depositors and makes local mortgage loans on homes. Its growth has been steady since its founding in 1934, its last statement showing assets of over \$3,250,000.

Commonwealth, Inc., will engage in making construction loans in this vicinity. It is financing the Manbrin Gardens housing development on the North River road. Willard Day is to be the local manager.

Becke and Wadsworth resume an independent status which they had before merging with the insurance department of Hawkins and Roberts a number of years ago. The partners are Karl Becke and Leslie Wadsworth.

Air Accident Toll Stands At 177 Dead

A world-wide series of disastrous airplane crashes the past few days has taken 177 lives—more than a third of the 428 killed in major commercial and military crashes so far this year.

The worst tragedy and biggest plane disaster in the history of the United States was the crash of an Eastern Airlines DC-4 Friday near Port Deposit, Md., with the loss of 53 lives. The cause still was in doubt but some witnesses told investigators they saw the tail section of the big plane come off before it plunged in flames.

Less than 24 hours earlier, the previous worst crashup in the nation's aviation history occurred when a United Air Lines plane was wrecked in an attempted take-off in New York, causing 41 deaths. Investigators said a sudden shift in wind took place as the plane was attaining air speed.

Crash Near Tokyo

Near Tokyo, an army transport crashed in the mountains Thursday, killing 40. The American craft struck a 500 foot ridge as it was approaching Tachikawa for a landing. A complete casualty list was expected Tuesday.

Bad visibility was suggested as a possible cause for the crashup of an Icelandic Airways plane which struck a mountain in northern Iceland Thursday, killing 25.

Twelve persons were killed in the collision of two planes Thursday at Tillburg, The Netherlands. Three plane crashes in Argentina

the past three days killed four and injured one critically.

Other Crashes

An army B-29 crashed on a takeoff at Fairbanks, Alaska, Thursday. Twelve were injured at Bogota, Colombia, when a Colombian army airforce transport crashed Friday after striking a buzzard. A Royal air force Liberator bomber blew up on an airport runway Friday at Litchfield, England, injuring four civilians.

Domestic plane travel at La Guardia field, New York, dropped below peak capacity Saturday. Although some airline representatives said unofficially the recent air crashes might be the cause, the majority said the condition was normal in the middle of a week-end holiday.

Boy, Girl Return

A boy and girl, both 14 years old and members of neighboring families in the Turner area, returned to their homes last night after visiting in Tacoma, Wash. Marion county sheriff's deputies reported. The parents meanwhile had become alarmed at the children's absence and called Sheriff Denver Young who, with two deputies, assisted a state policeman and many people of the neighborhood in searching for the children. They had been gone for several days, the parents reported.

5 Students Die In China Riot

SHANGHAI, May 31—(AP)—A riot in Canton in which five students were reported killed and scores were injured or missing featured China's deepening crisis today.

The civil war worsened, currency declined steadily and the nation figuratively held its breath in anticipation of the threatened anti-war student demonstrations two days hence.

Dispatches from Canton said 2,000 students of Sun Yat-Sen university began a premature demonstration and that five were "bumped off" in a melee for which responsibility was not clearly fixed.

Unique Glass Prints Pictures Inside Goblets

NEW YORK, May 31—(AP)—A new kind of glass that prints pictures in color, permanently inside glass goblets, dishes, windows or picture frames is announced by the Corning Glass works.

This unique glass acts just like photographic printing paper. Any photo images can be reproduced perfectly, sometimes with three-dimensional effect, in two simple steps through use of sunlight and heat.

Since the picture, or any desired design or lettering, extends inside the glass or runs all the way through the glass, it is safe from scratchin, fading or bending — safe from any damage except smashing the glass.

The glass is crystal clear when made. To reproduce a picture, the negative of that photo is placed on the glass and exposed for a few minutes to ultraviolet light. This can be sunlight, a sun lamp, or other ultraviolet source. The negative then is removed and the glass is heated to a temperature of 1,000 degrees fahrenheit. This heating "develops" the photograph.

Corning calls it photo-sensitive glass, a new photographic medium.

Phone Unions Talk with CIO

PHILADELPHIA, May 31—(AP)—John J. Moran of Pittsburgh, president of the American Union of Telephone Workers (independent), said today "there is no hope for isolationism among the telephone workers."

Moran, who came here to attend a meeting of a telephone workers organizing committee aimed at bringing telephone workers into one group under the CIO, told a reporter "the recent strike would have been further advanced and produced better results if there had been a single unit."

Forty-three telephone workers representing 15 different employe groups from 12 states attended the opening session of the two-day meeting. The delegates represented approximately 200,000 telephone workers.

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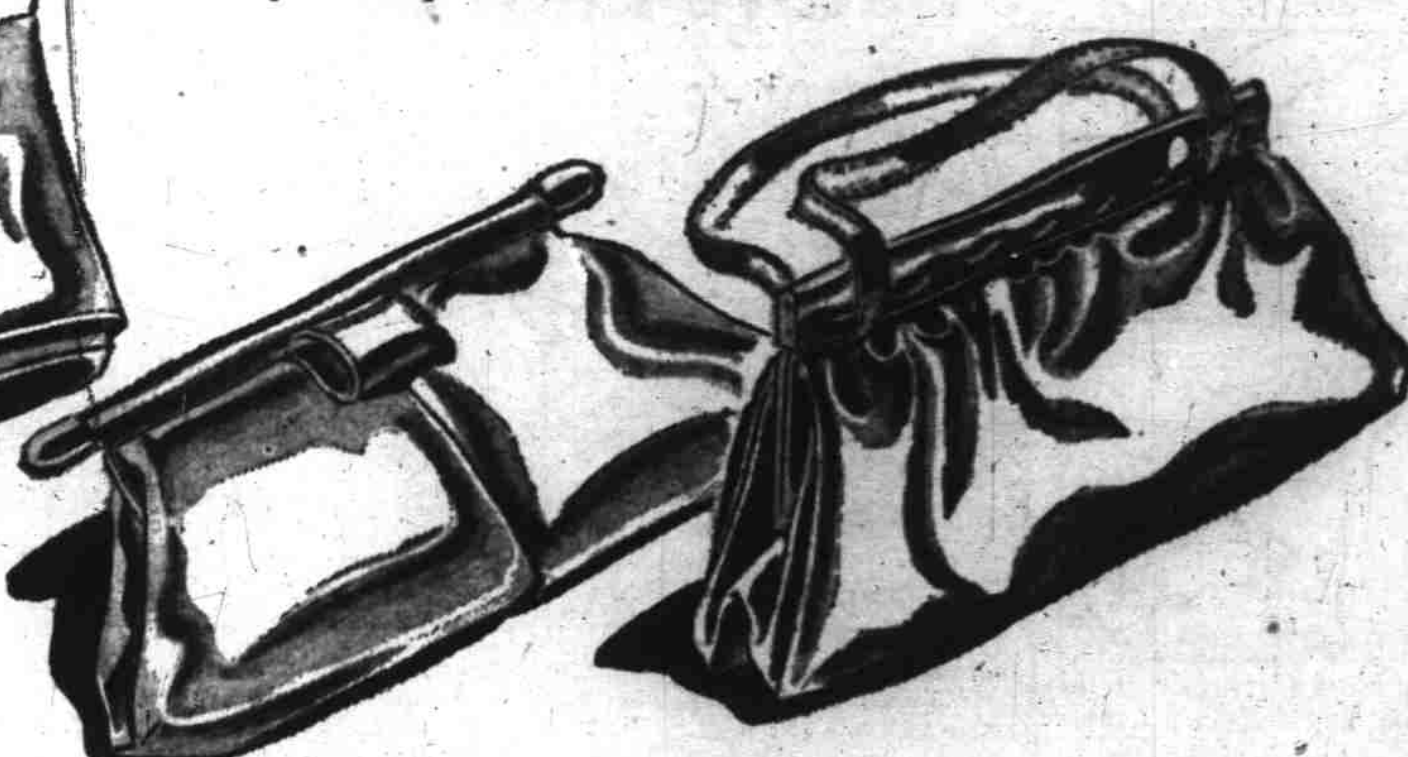
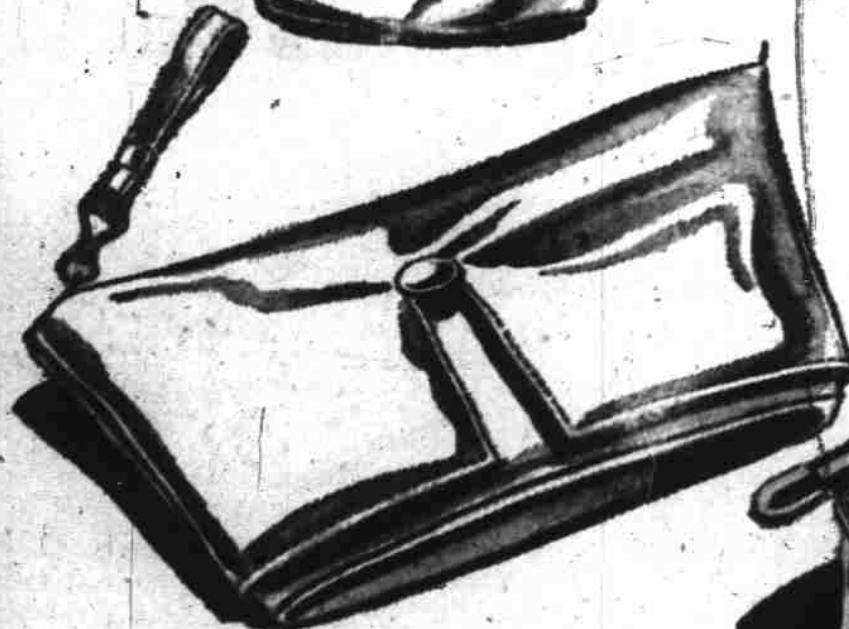
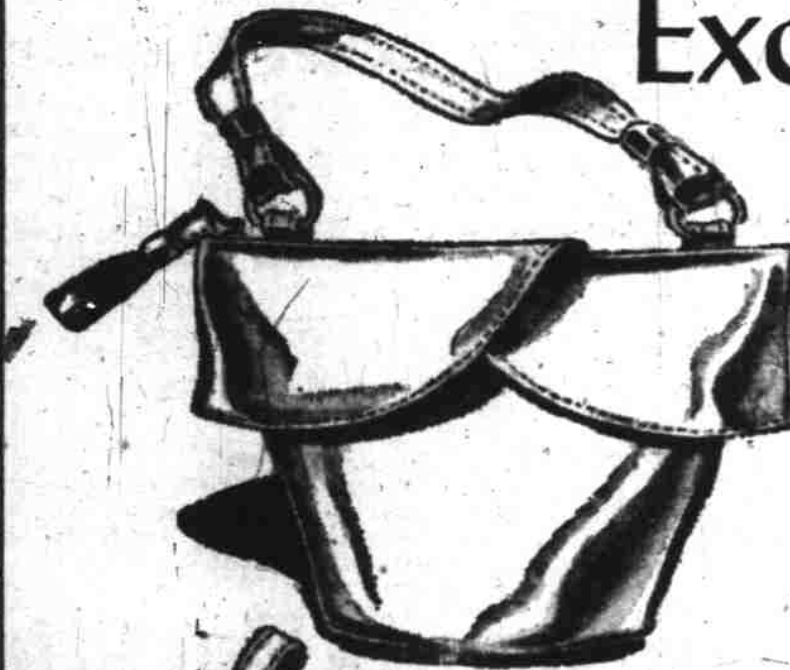


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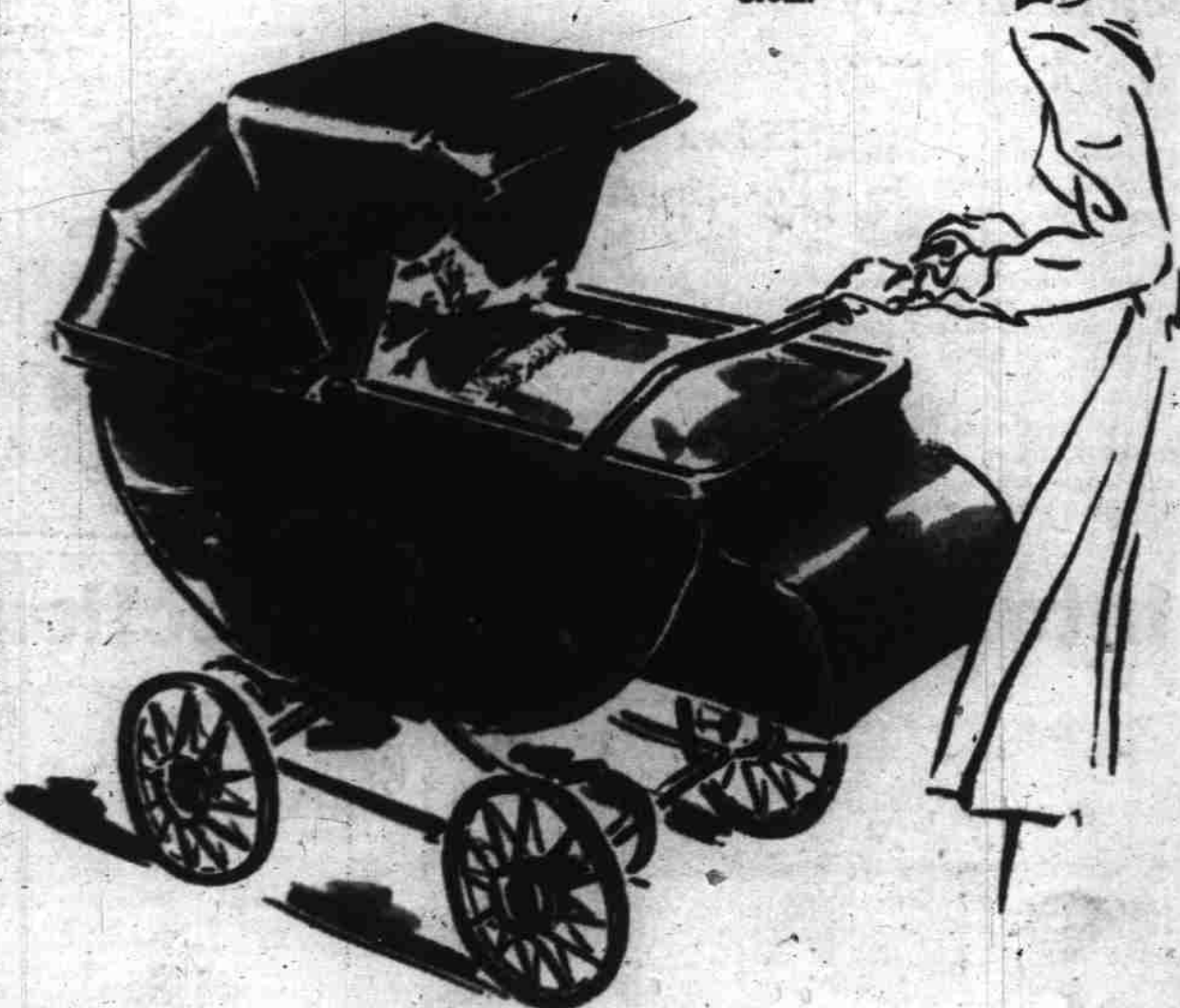
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
